The Game



Both teams will be making their first Myrtle Beach Bowl appearance.

Following an appearance in the American Athletic Conference championship game in 2020, Tulsa put together a six-win season and will be carrying a three-game winning streak to the Grand Strand. The Golden Hurricane finished fifth in the conference standings with their second-consecutive winning conference record.

After starting the season 1-6, Old Dominion won five straight games to close out their season. A 56-34 victory over Charlotte in their final regular season game made the Monarchs bowl eligible for just the second time in program history and secured the third-place spot in the Conference USA East Division standings.

The Series

The Myrtle Beach Bowl will be the first-ever meeting between Tulsa and Old Dominion.





Old Dominion Bowl History

ODU will be making their second-ever appearance in a bowl game. After a 10-3 season, the Monarchs defeated Eastern Michigan 24-20 in the 2016 Popeyes Bahamas Bowl in their debut.

The Monarchs brought back their football program in 2009 following a 68-year absence. ODU transitioned to the NCAA Division I Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) by joining Conference USA in 2014.

Tulsa Bowl History

The Golden Hurricane will be making their 23rd bowl game appearance with this year's Myrtle Beach Bowl, holding a 10-12 record. Tulsa fell to Mississippi State in the 2020 Lockheed Martin Armed Forces Bowl 28-26 in their last bowl game appearance.

Tulsa made their bowl debut in the 1942 Sun Bowl, defeating Texas Tech 6-0 in El Paso, Texas. Under current head coach Philip Montgomery, the Golden Hurricane have been to three bowl games, with a 1-2 record.

Myrtle Beach Bowl History

The inaugural Myrtle Beach Bowl was held on Dec. 21, 2020, and featured the Sun Belt's Appalachian State and Conference USA's North Texas. The Mountaineers used a rushing attack of 502 yards to take down the Mean Green 56-28 at Brooks Stadium. Appalachian State running back Cameron Peoples set the all-time NCAA bowl game record with 317 rushing yards and five touchdowns in the victory.

Brooks Climbing the Ladder

Tulsa senior running back Shamari Brooks has spent the 2021 season rising up the Tulsa career rushing list. After missing the 2020 season with an ACL injury, Brooks returned this fall and has rushed for 922 yards through 12 games.

The Tulsa native entered the season fifth all-time in career rushing yards and has moved up a pair of spots into third place with 3,622 career yards.

Brooks could move into second place all-time in the 2021 Myrtle Beach Bowl, trailing Tarrion Adams (2005-08) by just 29 yards entering the contest.

Monarchs Rally to Earn Bowl Berth

Through mid-October, the prospects of Old Dominion playing in a bowl game seemed far-fetched. The Monarchs were stitting at 1-6 overall after not playing at all during the 2020 season and posting a 1-11 record in 2019.

However, Ricky Rahne's group pulled itself together and rattled off five consecutive victories against Louisiana Tech, FIU, Florida Atlantic, Middle Tennessee and Charlotte to become bowl eligible for the first time since 2016.

WELCOME TO BROOKS STADIUM



The Coastal Carolina University football stadium officially opened as Brooks Stadium on Sept. 6, 2003, for the inaugural home game of the Chanticleer football program. Scoring a touchdown with just seconds left on the clock, the Chanticleers defeated Newberry College 21-14.

With a gift from the late businessman Bob Brooks, the stadium was named in honor of Brooks' children Coby Garrett and Boni Belle. The \$2 million gift was among the largest gifts ever made to the University.

Brooks, who grew up on a farm in Loris, S.C., was the CEO and founder of Eastern

Foods, Inc., creators of the Naturally Fresh line of products, and chairman of Hooters of America, Inc. He also created Hooters Air Charter Airline, the National Golf Association Hooters Tour and the Hooters ProCup Series, a series of short-track races in small towns throughout the Southeast and Midwest. Brooks died in 2006.

Phase I of the stadium construction included 6,408 seats, while Phase II added almost 1,000 additional seats prior to the 2006 season. The third phase of Brooks Stadium was completed in 2010 when approximately 1,600 seats were added directly behind the north end zone. Affectionately referred to as



the Chantourage section, the seating directly in front of the field house was designated as the student section in 2011.

Brooks Stadium has been ranked among the top stadiums in the nation in attendance based on capacity. In 2010, the Chanticleers hosted a first-round NCAA Division I Football Championship playoff game against Western Illinois. The game marked the first postseason game played in Brooks Stadium.

On Feb. 15, 2013, the women's lacrosse team opened its inaugural season on its new home field inside Brooks Stadium. Women's lacrosse was the 18th Division I sports program for the Chanticleers.

The facility underwent a major transformation in the spring of 2015 as Benton Field went from natural grass to artificial teal turf ... or "The Surf Turf." The first pieces of Powerblade SD turf were laid on April 2 and the project was completed later that month. The project had a budget of \$1.2 million.

Brooks Stadium was designed and built with the capability to expand from its inception. That original design is coming to fruition as Coastal embarked on another two-phase expansion in the spring of 2017 that will ultimately bring the capacity to approximately 20,000.

The first phase boosted the seating capacity to at 15,000 and included adding seats to both corners of the end zone nearest the field house, expanding the sections closest to the field on both sides toward the scoreboard, and expanding the upper deck on the east side to match the length of the lower deck.

Prior to the 2019 season, a second level and premium suites will be completed on the west side to increase the capacity to 20,000. The cost of the two-phase project was \$31.8 million.

matchups from among three conference partners — Conference USA, the Mid-American Conference and the Sun Belt Conference — with each participating four times between 2020 and 2025.

"I'm grateful to have the opportunity to be a part of the Myrtle Beach Bowl alongside ESPN Events and many members of the community, and look forward to making the inaugural year a success," Quigley said. "I would like to send a heartfelt thank you to each person who has spent time mentoring, supporting and encouraging me throughout my career."

Quigley has previously worked with Clemson University Athletics, the Philadelphia Eagles and Boston Red Sox. She also worked with ESPN Events when the Puerto Rico Tip-Off was relocated to Myrtle Beach in 2017, as well as on the Myrtle Beach Invitational in 2018 and 2019.

In addition, she has assisted with production surrounding the Super Bowl XLVIII (New York/New Jersey), Super Bowl LI (Houston), Super Bowl LII (Minneapolis), Super Bowl LIII (Atlanta) and Super Bowl LIV (Miami).

A native of West Chester, Penn., Quigley graduated from Clemson University with a bachelor's degree in marketing. She is happily married to her husband Daniel and the couple enjoys time with their two dogs.

"SURF TURF" HOSTS MYRTLE BEACH BOWL

A total of eight colleges and universities throughout the United States uniquely colored turf. The "Surf Turf" is the home to the Coastal Carolina Chanticleers football team on the campus of Coastal Carolina University and the location of the Myrtle Beach Bowl. The teal-colored turf is just the second in the history of the NCAA Football Bowl Series (FBS) to host a post-season bowl on a non-traditional colored surface.

Brooks Stadium is no a stranger to post-season play as the Chanticleers hosted a first-round NCAA Division I Football Championship playoff game against Western Illinois, in 2010. Coastal hosted three more playoff contests between the 2013 and 2014 seasons all on natural grass. In January of 2015, the renovation began for the transformation from natural grass to the teal turf. By early April, the first pieces of the new "Teal Turf" were laid receiving attention to numerous national news outlets, USA Today, Yahoo!, CBS, and FOX.

Boise State's Albertson's Stadium became the first non-traditional colored surface to host a post-season bowl game when the Big West Conference lost its lone affiliation with the Vegas Bowl. The Big West came up with the idea of creating it owns bowl in 1997 and the

Broncos volunteered to host the inaugural Sports Humanitarian Bowl with a match up of Utah State and Cincinnati. Over the years, the bowl name has changed from the Sports Humanitarian Bowl to the now Famous Idaho Potato Bowl.

On November 13, 2018, ESPN Events partnered with the city of Myrtle Beach to create the Myrtle Beach Bowl Game to be played on the campus of Coastal Carolina University beginning in 2020. Coastal Carolina's "Surf Turf" becomes the second non-traditional colored playing surface to host a FBS bowl game. The Myrtle Beach Bowl will feature a match-up of two teams from one of three conferences (Sun Belt, Mid-American, and Conference USA).

In the inaugural year 2020, the first match-up featured teams from the Sun Belt and Conference USA as Appalachian State takes on North Texas. The second annual Myrtle Beach Bowl between Old Dominion and Tulsa will take place December 20, 2021 on ESPN with a kickoff scheduled for 2:30 p.m. ET.

APPALACHIAN STATE 56, NORTH TEXAS 28

The inaugural Myrtle Beach Bowl will be remembered as a record-setting day for Appalachian State sophomore running back Cameron Peoples.

The Lineville, Ala., native had 29 carries for 317 yards and five rushing touchdowns in the 56-28 win over North Texas at Brooks Stadium. Peoples set the all-time NCAA bowl record with 317 rushing yards and five rushing touchdowns. He scored on runs of 3, 64, 62, 4, and 11 yards for the Mountaineers.

Peoples broke the single-game bowl record for most rushing yards, previously held by Georgia Tech's PJ Daniels, who had 307 rushing yards against Tulsa in the 2004 Humanitarian Bowl.

Peoples also became the seventh player in NCAA history to score five rushing touchdowns in a bowl game. Toledo's Kareem Hunt (2014 GoDaddy.com) and Barry Sanders (1988 Holiday Bowl) are two of the notable names on the list.

Appalachian State (9-3) became the fourth team in NCAA history to rush for 500 or more yards in a bowl game. The Mountaineers ran the ball 49 times for 502 yards and six rushing touchdowns in the win. ASU's 502 rushing yards are the fourth-most by a team in NCAA bowl history.



Peoples wasn't the only ASU player that found success on the ground against the Mean Green. Senior running back Marcus Williams, Jr., recorded 101 rushing yards and one touchdown on six carries. He scored on a 70-yard run to push ASU's lead to 28-7 with 2:29 left in the first half.

Peoples and Williams combined for 420 rushing yards, the second-highest rushing total by a pair of teammates in NCAA bowl history. Baylor's Johnny Jefferson (299) and Devin Chafin (161) combined for 460 rushing yards against North Carolina in the 2015 Russell Athletic Bowl.

North Texas (4-6) had success on the ground as well. The Mean Green ran the ball 59 times for 242 yards. Tre Siggers had 17 carries for 120 yards, while teammate Oscar Adaway added 26 carries for 97 yards and one touchdown.

ASU (502) and North Texas (242) combined for 742 rushing yards, the fourth-most combined rushing yards in NCAA bowl history.

Appalachian State scored on five touchdowns of seven first-half possessions to take a 35-14 halftime lead.

OLD DOMINION UNIVERSITY



Brian O. Hemphill, Ph.D. President

Old Dominion University, located in Norfolk, is Virginia's forward-focused public doctoral research university with approximately 23,500 students, rigorous academics, an energetic residential community and initiatives that contribute \$2.6 billion annually to Virginia's economy. ODU's students come from all 50 states and nearly 100 countries. Brian O. Hemphill, Ph.D., became the University's ninth president this summer.

Old Dominion, established in 1930 as the Norfolk Division of the College of William & Mary, has the most affordable tuition of any doctoral-granting university in Virginia and is the only doctoral institution to freeze tuition and fees for in-state undergraduates this year. It has been named a Best National University by U.S. News & World Report.

ODU recently placed among the top 10% of institutions in the nation and No. 1 in Virginia in CollegeNET Inc.'s eighth annual Social Mobility Index (SMI) rankings. It has been named a "top performer" in social mobility by U.S.

News & World Report and ranked fourth in country and 49th in the world for reducing inequalities in the Times Higher Education World University Rankings. Twenty-five percent of spring 2021 bachelor's recipients were first in their family to receive a degree.

OU is a champion of diversity. The University enrolled 7,000 African American students in fall 2020 – more than any other four year public institution in Virginia, and 53% of undergraduates in fall 2020 were students of color. It was named a top-15 university for African American student success by Education Trust.

Located near Naval Station Norfolk, headquarters and home port of the U.S. Navy's Fleet Forces Command, ODU is committed to serving the military community. Twenty-five percent of its student body is military affiliated, and the University ranked No. 1 in Virginia in "Best for Vets" category by Military Times.

The University has been a leader in virtual learning, offering more than 100 programs completely online. ODU is ranked as the No. 1 Virginia college by OnlineColleges.com; 68% of students participate in online learning and 28% are totally online.

A new Chemistry Building and Hugo A. Owens House opened this spring. The Chemistry Building features 24 research labs, 13 teaching labs and a 122-seat planetarium and digital theater. Owens House provides living-learning communities for students in STEM-H fields and is named for a local civil rights leader who was Old Dominion's first African American rector. The University also broke ground for a new Health Sciences Building. The University recently announced a partnership with Eastern Virginia Medical School, Norfolk State University and Sentara Healthcare to establish a new School of Public Health.

More than 4,800 students are enrolled in ODU's Graduate School, which was established in 2016.

OLD DOMINION ATHLETICS



In its 12th season under the guidance of Director of Athletics Dr. Wood Selig, Old Dominion Athletics has continued to enjoy success both on and off the field.

The 2020-21 season saw ODU athletics have its highest cumulative GPA ever at 3.31 last spring and the success has followed on the field with the success of this year's women's soccer team, which won its first Conference USA Championship and earned its second ever berth to the NCAA Tournament.

Dr. Wood Selig Athletic Director

ODU has won 12 team conference championships in Selig's tenure, including a pair of men's soccer championships, while the women's golf and women's tennis teams earned

at-large NCAA Tournament bids.

Old Dominion did not begin playing football until 2009 and in its third year of competition competed in the FCS playoffs and in 2012, won the CAA Championship. ODU jumped to FBS and Conference USA the following year and in 2016 the Monarchs went 10-3 and won the Bahamas Bowl.

In 2019, Selig led a massive undertaking as ODU's football stadium, Foreman Field, was torn down and rebuilt in nine months and turned into the state of the art, Kornblau Field at S.B. Ballard Stadium. The newly renovated S.B. Ballard Stadium opened August 31, 2019, when ODU defeated crosstown foe Norfolk State. Kornblau Field at S.B. Ballard Stadium.

Old Dominion has won 28 team national championships in school history and more than 60 conference championships since joining Division I in 1976.







RICKY RAHNE Old Dominion Head Coach



Ricky Rahne is in his first season and second overall as head football coach at Old Dominion.

Rahne was the offensive coordinator at Penn State for two seasons and on the Nittany Lions coaching staff for six years.

For the past nine years, Rahne (pronounced ronnie) has developed an increasing national profile as a key component of Coach James Franklin's staff at both Penn State and Vanderbilt. The coaching staff has guided those teams to bowl games in each of the nine years and have won nine or more games in six of the last eight seasons.

Rahne has spent six seasons at Penn State, including the last two as offensive coordinator. Despite having a new starting quarterback, Rahne helped lead the Nittany Lion offense to 34 points per game this season, while six offensive players earned all-Big10 honors this season.

Known as a terrific offensive mind that can adjust to his personnel, Rahne demonstrated that again in 2019. Despite the loss of the No. 2 overall pick in the 2018 NFL Draft (Saquon Barkley), Penn State rushed for the most yards per game in the last 10 years at 204.9. PSU had nine players earn all-conference accolades, and the Nittany Lions led the Big10 with 42 red zone touchdowns, good for 16th in FBS.



Rahne was the quarterbacks coach in four of his six seasons at Penn State, as both of the quarterbacks he worked with were drafted into the NFL. In 2015, Christian Hackenberg (Jets, 2016) became the all-time leader in career yards passing with 8,457 yards, Three years later, Rahne guided Trace McSorely (Ravens, 2019) past that mark in 2018 with 9,899 yards. He also coached the tight ends in 2016 and 2017, guiding Mike Gesicki who was drafted by the Miami Dolphins.

Penn State has played in a bowl game in every year Rahne was there, including a 2016 Big10 Championship and 2017 Play-Station Fiesta Bowl win over Washington. In that time, Penn State has had four-straight seasons of at least nine wins, and the Nittany Lions are one of five teams to rank in the Top-15 of the College Football Playoff final rankings in each of the last four years.

Prior to joining Penn State, Rahne was the quarterbacks coach at Vanderbilt for three years.



Prior to Rahne's time at Vanderbilt, the program had been to four bowl games in 121 years of football, none in consecutive seasons. The Commodores were ranked in the Top-25 in the final polls in 2012 and 2013 marking the first time they were ranked in back-to-back seasons in program history.

He spent five years at Kansas State, starting as an offensive graduate assistant before coaching the running backs and tight ends. He helped the Wildcats to two bowl appearances.

Rahne started his coaching career on the defensive side at Holy Cross coaching the defensive line. The following year he coached the running backs at his alma mater, Cornell.

He was a three-year starter at quarterback at Cornell (2002), and graduated as the Big Red's all-time leader in completions (678), passing yards (7,710), touchdown passes (54) and total offense (7,994). He was inducted into the Cornell Hall of Fame in 2014.

Rahne and his wife, Jennifer, have two sons, Ryder and Jake.

Old Dominion had not played a football game in 643 days and although the Monarchs at times showed flashes of potential, they also showed the effects of the long layoff.

Wake Forest took a big early lead in large part because of ODU mistakes and rolled past the Monarchs, 42-10 Friday night at Truist Field. It was ODU's first game since the Monarchs fell to Charlotte on Nov. 30, 2019. ODU did not play last season because of the pandemic.

The game marked the head coaching debut of Ricky Rahne, the former Penn State offensive coordinator.

Norfolk native and Central Florida transfer D.J. Mack Jr. started at quarterback but the Monarchs did not get their passing game in gear when it mattered. Mack completed 7 of 21 passes and had two interceptions before going to the bench early in the fourth quarter.

Redshirt freshman Hayden Wolff took over for Mack, and led the Monarchs on their only touchdown drive, a 55-yard possession capped off by a 9-yard TD pass to tight end Isaiah Spencer with three minutes left. Wolff completed of 11 of 17 passes for 88 yards, though much of his yardage came against Wake Forest substitutes.

Wake Forest took a 28-3 lead in a first half that was much closer statistically than the score would indicate. The Demon Deacons outgained the Monarchs, 193-130, but took advantage of numerous ODU mistakes, including two interceptions and poor tackling on a kickoff return, to take the 24-point lead.





Old Dominion's football team gave head coach Ricky Rahne a successful and satisfying home debut at Kornblau Field at S.B. Ballard Stadium, and ended the university's longest losing streak, in resounding fashion Saturday night.

Coming off a 42-10 defeat at Wake Forest in which the Monarchs were mistake prone, ODU was nearly flawless offensively, defensively and on special teams in a record-setting, 47-7 blowout victory over Hampton.

It was also ODU's first victory in more than two years. The Monarchs last won on August 31, 2019, when they rallied to defeat Norfolk State, 24-21, in the first game played on the then newly-renovated S.B. Ballard Stadium.

It was a record setting night for the Monarchs. ODU rushed for 358 yards, breaking the school record of 340 yards set in 2009, ODU's first season of football, in a 31-10 victory over Georgetown.

The Monarchs also gave up just 187 yards, the fewest in school history, breaking the previous record of 213 set in 2016 against Marshall.

Quarterback D.J. Mack Jr., the transfer from Central Florida, struggled at Wake Forest, but ran the offense like the veteran he is against Hampton.

Mack completed 11 of 22 passes for 162 yards and a touchdown and ran for 57 yards and three touchdowns before heading to the sidelines midway through the third quarter.

Elijah Davis rushed eight times for 109 yards in the first half before heading to the bench with an injury. He was replaced by Jon-Luke Peaker, a true freshman from Philadelphia, who rushed 18 times for 141 yards. Peaker was fourth on ODU's depth chart when the season began. Bane a

Old Dominion's football team could not contain Liberty University standout quarterback Malik Willis and fell to the Flames, 45-17, Saturday night at Williams Stadium.

Liberty quarterback Malik Willis completed 21 of 28 passes for 242 yards and four touchdowns and ran for 77 yards and two more TDs, with nearly all that yardage coming in the first three quarters.

ODU quarterback D.J. Mack Jr. completed 15 of 27 passes for 134 yards and a touchdown. But Mack was often rushed from the pocket and was sacked five times.

ODU kept it close for a while. The Monarchs rallied in the final minutes of the first half to drive 75 yards for a touchdown that narrowed what had been a 21-3 Liberty lead to 28-17.

But the Flames asserted themselves quickly in the second half, sacking Mack twice on ODU's first possession, then driving 48 yards for a touchdown.

Willis passed 13 yards to Kevin Shaa for the touchdown and Liberty led, 35-17. The Monarchs never threatened again.

Zack Kuntz and Stone Smartt both had four pass receptions for ODU while Davis rushed for 57 yards.







Old Dominion lost a football game in which the Monarchs outhit, outplayed and outgained their opponent, and then lost in perhaps the most heartbreaking fashion possible Saturday night.

Trailing 35-7 after a first half in which they had a field goal blocked and returned 90 yards for a touchdown, a fumble returned 67 yards for another TD, and dropped a potential touchdown pass, the Monarchs battled back into a game that appeared lost with an inspiring comeback.

ODU dominated the second half. ODU's defense limited the Bulls to 40 yards while the offense scored 27 points and rolled to 319 yards.

But the Monarchs could not get the final point they needed to send the game into overtime when placekicker Nick Rice missed the point after touchdown, allowing the Bulls to escape with a 35-34 victory.

ODU had 10 penalties, perhaps the most hurtful came after Zack Kuntz, the tight end transfer from Penn State, leaped and caught a 19-yard touchdown pass from D.J. Mack Jr. with 19 seconds left that left the Monarchs a PAT away from overtime.

However, ODU players ran off the bench to celebrate and referees called the Monarchs for an unsportsmanlike conduct penalty. That moved the ball back to the 18, meaning it was a 35-yard PAT, the kind of kick Rice usually makes, but not a chip shot.

Rice pushed it to the right of the upright by inches.





As it did a week ago against Buffalo, Old Dominion's football team staged a furious second-half comeback and then lost a heartbreaker.

Trailing UTEP, 17-0 with just 51 seconds left in the first half, the Monarchs stormed back to take a 21-20 lead late in the third quarter.

But then UTEP staged a comeback of its own, driving 63 yards in seven minutes in the fourth quarter to claim a 28-21 victory in the Conference USA opener for both teams.

UTEP took a 26-21 lead after Deion Hankins carried from the three for the touchdown. The Miners went for the 2-point conversion and quarterback Garvin Hardison, who had plenty of time, found Justin Garrett on a pass to make it 28-21 with 6:59 left.

ODU then drove to its own 43 and on third down, Dy'Vonne Inyang intercepted a D.J. Mack pass with 4:16 left.

ODU had two more possessions.

The first started at their 31, but four plays later, ODU quarterback D.J. Mack Jr. was pulled down while scrambling at the 36 and the ball turned over on downs with 3:15 left.

ODU's defense, which generally played well, forced UTEP to punt and ODU had the ball at its 5-yard line 1:23 left and no timeouts.

The Monarchs then gave UTEP a major scare, driving to the UTEP 31, where they had a first down with 1:07 left.

But on fourth down, Mack's heaved a pass toward 6-foot-8 tight end Zack Zuntz in the right corner of the end zone, but overthrew him.



Shadeed Ahmed caught a 22-yard touchdown pass from Grant Wells in overtime and D.J. Mack Jr.'s fourth down pass fell incomplete to give Marshall a 20-13 overtime win in Huntington Saturday afternoon at Joan C. Edwards Stadium.

Willie Johnson caught a 52-yard touchdown pass from Wells to tie the game at 13 with 33 seconds left.

On the ensuing drive, Mack completed a pair of passes to Zack Kuntz and Isiah Paige, and Blake Watson rushed for six yards to set up a 58-yard field goal attempt by Nick Rice, which fell just short to send the game into overtime.

Blake Watson led ODU with a career-day, rushing 26 times for 168 yards, including a career-long 43 yard run.

ODU held Marshall to 390 yards of offense, 150 below its season average.

Cory McCoy intercepted a pass for Marshall to set up the Herd at the ODU 20 midway through the first quarter. The ODU defense held firm again and held Marshall to a four play, -6 yard drive that resulted in a 42-yard Shane Ciucci field goal.

The Monarchs countered with a nine play, 81yard drive capped by a 33-yard touchdown pass from D.J. Mack to Ali Jennings III to take a 7-3 lead to end the first quarter.

After another ODU defensive stop, the Monarchs drove 73 yards in 13 plays as Nick Rice drilled a 47-yard field goal to put ODU on top 10-3 with 6:38 remaining in the second quarter.

Marshall cut the ODU lead to 10.6 with another field goal by Ciucci, this one a 22-yarder to cap a 76-yard, 14 play drive.

GAME 7 Oct. 16 vs. Western Kentucky | Norfolk, Va.



In a decision he kept a secret until minutes before gametime, Old Dominion football Coach Ricky Rahne started redshirt freshman Hayden Wolff at quarterback Saturday in place of D.J. Mack Jr., who started the Monarchs' six previous games.

And while Wolff threw well, especially in the second half, the Monarchs buried themselves with a series of early mistakes and fell to Western Kentucky, 43-20, before a homecoming crowd of 16,418 at S.B. Ballard Stadium.

It was the fourth consecutive loss for the Monarchs, who lost the previous three in heartbreaking fashion.

This game was still in doubt midway through the fourth quarter, as the Monarchs staged a late comeback that trimmed WKU's lead to 13. But ODU could not overcome its poor start.

ODU essentially committed three first-half turnovers – if you include a pass intercepted by a Monarch defender and fumbled into the hands of a WKU receiver – and found themselves trailing, 30-3, at halftime.

Wolff had two interceptions – the second in the waning moments when a storm whipped around S.B. Ballard Stadium with wind and rain – but had the best passing performance for the Monarchs since 2019. He completed 26 of 41 passes for 327 yards – it was the first time ODU passed for more than 300 yards since 2019, when he passed for 321 yards at Middle Tennessee.

ODU wide receiver Ali Jennings III, the transfer from West Virginia, also had his best game of the season, hauling in 13 passes for 172 yards. He fell one catch short of tying the school record for pass receptions in a game.







After so much heartbreak, and so much frustration, there was finally joy in the Old Dominion football locker room Saturday night.

The Monarch defense made a clutch, fourthdown stop near midfield, the offense gained just enough yardage to set up a field goal and senior Nick Rice kicked a 46-yard, gamewinner as time expired to give ODU a 23-20 victory over Louisiana Tech at S.B. Ballard Stadium.

The victory was the first for ODU over a Football Bowl Subdivision team since Nov. 10, 2018, when the Monarchs defeated North Texas, $34{\cdot}31$.

The game was tied, 10-10, in a first half in which all of the scoring was packed into the final four minutes.

The Monarchs got their most explosive play of the year when freshman LaMareon Jones received a kick two yards deep in the end zone, broke to his right and returned it untouched for a touchdown.

ODU took a 17-10 lead on its first drive of the second half when quarterback Hayden Wolff faked a handoff and threw to tight end Zack Kuntz for a 5-yard touchdown.

Louisiana Tech then got a 44-yard field goal from Jacob Barnes and took a 20-17 led on a Marcus Williams 7-yard touchdown run with 12:01 left in the fourth quarter.

ODU then mounted an extraordinary, 58-yard drive that took 20 plays and milked 10:02 off the clock. Wolff, who completed 23-of-34 passes for 149 yards, was 8-for-10 on that drive.

Facing fourth and goal from the 13, Rahne called on Rice to kick a 29-yard field goal that tied it up with 1:52 left.

Old Dominion's offense struggled much of the season but got untracked early on, and ODU's defense played a typically strong game, as the Monarchs claimed their first winning streak since 2018.

The Monarchs burst for 24 first-quarter points and rolled to 565 offensive yards to power past Florida International, 47-24, Saturday night at FIU Stadium in Miami.

Running backs Blake Watson and Elijah Davis both broke the 100-yard rushing mark and quarterback Hayden Wolff, a Venice, Florida native, completed 22 of 42 passes for 283 yards and two touchdowns.

Watson rushed a career-high 28 times for 158 yards and two touchdowns. It was Watson's fourth consecutive game with 100 yards or more. Davis, who has been slowed with injuries, rushed 10 times for 114 yards and a touchdown.

Tight end Zack Kuntz caught a career-high tying nine passes for 102 yards.

ODU's defense, the strongest in school history, sacked quarterback Max Bortenschlager five times and scored a touchdown on the first play of the fourth quarter to give the Monarchs some breathing room in what had been a two-score game.

ODU came into the game averaging 23 points per game but surpassed that number with 27 seconds left in the first quarter, when Watson capped a 49-yard drive with a 3-yard run to give the Monarchs a 24-7 lead.

ODU's defense came up big the rest of the game, holding FIU on downs after two turnovers, and coming up with a huge touchdown early in the fourth quarter.









Old Dominion continued a dramatic turnaround in its football fortunes and won one of the most unusual games ever played, to extend its winning streak to three games.

ODU's defense scored two safeties, the most in a Conference USA game since 1996, and the offense exploded in the second half as the Monarchs claimed a 30-16 victory over Florida Atlantic Saturday night at S.B. Ballard Stadium.

In all, ODU scored two points on four different plays, an achievement that has rarely occurred elsewhere. There were also five fumbles, including two lost by ODU in the game's opening minutes.

Hayden Wolff completed 21-of-33 passes for 289 yards and a touchdown with no interceptions. He threaded the needle on several long passes, including a 48-yard pass to Ali Jennings and a 46-yard pass to tight end Donta Anthony.

Running back Blake Watson rushed 23 times for 163 yards and a touchdown as the Monarch offense rolled to 448 yards. It was Watson's fifth game in a row with more than 100 rushing yards.

ODU's defense held FAU to 308 yards, and that occurred in part because the offense was on the field much of the game. The offense had 75 plays to 55 for the D.

ODU scored two safeties in the first half, the first when Marcus Haynes tackled FAU quarterback N'Kosi Perry in the end zone that narrowed an Owls lead to $3\cdot 2$ with 6:16 left in the first quarter.

The defense gave ODU a 4-3 lead with its second safety minutes later. With FAU facing a second down at its own 1, defensive tackle Sokoya McDuffie forced Perry to throw a hurried pass out of bounds. Perry was penalized for intentional grounding, and ODU was awarded a safety.



GAME 11 Nov. 20 at Middle Tennessee | Murfreesboro, Tenn.



Old Dominion exploded for 14 points in a three minute and 7 second stretch during the fourth quarter and defeated Middle Tennessee, 24-17, Saturday at Floyd Stadium. Elijah Davis ran virtually untouched for a 45-yard touchdown with 12:06 left, and then Blake Watson ran for a four-year touchdown run three minutes and 7 seconds later.

Jaylin Lane hauled in a 26-yard touchdown pass with 4:06 left that pulled Middle Tennessee within seven. But ODU recovered an on-side kick, and the Monarch defense came up big with 2:23 left, when freshman linebacker Jason Henderson forced an MTSU fumble, which was recovered by defensive tackle Devin Brandt-Epps.

ODU dodged a bullet at the beginning of the fourth quarter, when Middle Tennessee lined up for what would have been a 24-yard field goal attempt that never happened.

A poor snap was bobbled by the holder, who was smothered by ODU's R'Tarriun Johnson. That left the score tied at 10-10.

ODU then began what would be a critical drive at its 18, with Hayden Wolff completing three passes, including two to Isiah Paige. Facing third and 3 at the 45, Davis burst up the middle and ran untouched for the touchdown.

ODU's defense then forced a three and out and the Monarchs quickly scored again.

Wolff tossed a short pass to Ali Jennings, the transfer from West Virginia, who sprinted 60 yards to the MTSU 6. Two plays later, Wolff threw a pass to Blake Watson, and he rumbled into the end zone.



Old Dominion's football team concluded a remarkable regular-season comeback Saturday afternoon by rolling past Charlotte, 56-34, to win its fifth game in a row and become bowl eligible for the first time in five seasons.

The game was a back-and-forth affair, in which ODU lost a 21-point lead. But each time the 49ers punched, the Monarchs punched back.

The 56 points was the most ODU has scored in a Conference USA game since joining the league in 2014.

The game marked the 71st annual Oyster Bowl and the winner of the Melvin T. Blassingham MVP award was wide receiver Ali Jennings III, who had a career day for the Monarchs. The Richmond native, who transferred to ODU from West Virginia, hauled in nine passes for 252 yards and three touchdowns.

Blake Watson rushed 18 times for 106 times and two touchdowns and became only the second ODU player ever to rush for more than 1,000 yards.

Linebacker Jordan Young had 11 tackles and finished one short of tying the school record for tackles in a career, a record he will almost surely break in a bowl game.

Quarterback Hayden Wolff completed 17 of 26 passes for three touchdowns and 328 yards. And he agrees with Rahne that ODU has earned a bowl bid.

ODU's defense forced four turnovers, including a fumble recovered and carried into the end zone with three minutes left by Deeve Harris for the final ODU score.

Three turnovers and 122 yards in penalties was enough to seal defeat for the Tulsa Golden Hurricane on a Thursday night against the FCS' 23rd-ranked UC Davis Aggies by a score of 19-17 at H.A. Chapman Stadium.

The Aggies scored its lone touchdown on the game's opening possession and were held to four field goals the remainder of the game. Tulsa scored on a 41-yard Zack Long field goal, a one-yard run by Steven Anderson and a 59-yard rush by Deneric Prince.

The Hurricane threatened to take control of the game several times but turnovers came at the UC Davis 18, 47 and 8-yard line.

Prince ended the contest with a game-high 151 yards as Tulsa outgained UC Davis on the ground 247 to 88. UC Davis did its damage through the air, collecting 311 yards. Tulsa held a 448 to 399-yard edge in total offense. The Aggies converted 10-of-19 third downs, while Tulsa managed just 2-of-10 on third downs.

With the score tied 10-10 at halftime, Tulsa's opening second-half drive went just 13 yards in six plays. The Aggies took its possession 87 yards in nine plays and took a 13-10 lead on an Isaiah Gomez's 22-yard field goal. Tulsa wasted little time in taking the lead, scoring 1:20 later, when Deneric Prince raced 59 yards for a touchdown, capping a 4-play, 78-yard drive. UC Davis cut Tulsa's lead to one point, 17-16, on Gomez's third field goal of the night with 11:09 remaining.

The Aggies second interception put the ball at the Tulsa 5-yard line, and again the Hurricane defense bowed up and held UC Davis to three points, but it was enough for the visitors to take a two-point lead at 19-17 with 7:35 remaining in the contest. An apparent Tulsa touchdown on the subsequent possession, the ball was fumbled out of the end zone, thus ending any Tulsa scoring opportunity.





Tulsa made it a five-point game with three minutes remaining in the contest but fell 28-23 to the Oklahoma State Cowboys in the Bank of Oklahoma Turnpike Classic.

Tulsa held the Cowboys to just seven points in the first 45 minutes, but the home team scored 21 in the fourth quarter to claim its ninth straight series win in front of 52,127 fans at Boone Pickens Stadium.

The Hurricane took a 17-14 lead at the 10:56 mark on the game clock, but OSU returned the kickoff 98 yards to take a four-point lead, 21-17. The Cowboys added another score for an 11-point lead before the Hurricane cut the deficit to single digits with a 75-yard, seven-play drive with just over three minutes to play.

It was a game expected to be dominated by the defense and that's exactly what happened for the first 40 minutes Saturday afternoon. After totaling just 224 yards and 14 points between them in the first 30 minutes, the two teams combined for 37 points and 395 yards in the second half.

For the second straight week the Tulsa offense outgained its opponent as the Hurricane put up 347 yards to OSU's 313. Davis Brin completed 19-of-27 passes for 224 yards, while rushing for a team-high 37 yards. JuanCarlos Santana caught four passes for 61 yards and Sam Crawford Jr. was next with three receptions for 57 yards.



Tulsa had the No. 9-ranked Ohio State Buckeyes on the ropes late in the fourth quarter before the home team added two scores in the final three minutes for a 41-20 victory at Ohio Stadium.

The Hurricane amassed 501 total yards with 428 of those coming through the air. Davis Brin completed 31-of-54 yards and added two touchdown tosses.

Ohio State led 13-6 at halftime, but Henderson put some separation on the scoreboard with a 48-yard scamper on the Buckeyes' first second-half possession to give the home team a 20-6 lead.

The Hurricane scored its first TD of the game when Brin connected with Cannon Montgomery on a 21-yard catch and run to cut its deficit to seven points at 20-13, capping a 48-yard, 5-play drive with one minute remaining in the third quarter. But, the Buckeyes relied on their offensive star of the day when Henderson tallied his third rushing TD with a 52-yard jaunt to put the Buckeyes up by a score of 27-13.

Tulsa responded at the 12:07 mark of the fourth quarter with 22-yard toss from Brin to Johnson to bring the score to within seven points at 27-20. The score capped a 75-yard, six play drive for the Hurricane.

OSU added a 65-yard, 7-play scoring drive for a 34-20 lead and a 61-yard interception return with less than two minutes to play.







Tulsa put up over 600 yards of total offense and the defense had two takeaways in a 41-34 win over Arkansas State in front of 14,881 fans at H.A. Chapman Stadium.

Three of Tulsa's touchdowns came in a span of 29 seconds, as the scores covered 88, 34 and 75 yards and all coming on the first play from scrimmage.

Tulsa ended the first half by scoring 17 points in the final 3:23 to take a 24-14 lead into the locker room at halftime. The Hurricane began the second half with a 6-play, 75-yard scoring drive as Brin threw his third touchdown of the day, a 17-yarder to Sam Crawford for a 31-14 lead.

The two teams combined for three scores in a 25-second frame in the third quarter. ASU scored on a 76-yard, 6-play drive at the 10:34 mark, followed by Tulsa's Anthony Watkins going 75 yards on the first play from scrimmage to score with 10:23 on the clock. At 10:09, ASU's Alan Lamar took back the kickoff 93 yards to make the score 38-28. A-State added a field goal in the quarter to make the score 38-31 at the end of three.

Tulsa controlled the ball for 12:25 of the fourth quarter and split field goals with the Red Wolves.

For the 10th time in the Philip Montgomery era, Tulsa tallied more than 600 yards with 663 total yards and the 14th time to rush for over 300 yards under Montgomery. Tulsa's defense totaled season-highs of 10 TFL for -31 yards and six sacks for -25 yards.

The Houston Cougars jumped out to a quick start with 14 first quarter points en route to a 45-10 victory over Tulsa on a Friday night at H.A. Chapman Stadium.

Houston came in with the league's top defense and it showed as the Cougars held Tulsa to 289 yards of total offense and had three interceptions, including one returned 45 yards for a touchdown.

The Cougars gained 405 yards with 261 passing yards and 148 on the ground. Tulsa threw for 258 yards but was held to just 31 yards on the ground.

Houston jumped out to a 14-0 lead after one quarter and made it 28-0 before the Hurricane added a field goal to make the halftime score 28-3. On the first possession of the second half, the Cougars' Gervarrius Owns intercepted a Davis Brin pass and went 45 yards for a 35-3 lead.

The visitors made it 42-3 at the 14:55 mark of the fourth period before Tulsa scored its first touchdown on a 41-yard strike from Brin to Ezra Naylor II. UH added a field for the final margin of victory.

Tulsa's Sam Crawford Jr. had his second straight 100-yard receiving game with 101 yards on five receptions. Brin ended the day completing 20 of 39 passes for 258 yards and one touchdown. Houston's Clayton Tune completed 17-of-24 passes for 241 yards and two scores. Tulsa scored 21 second-half points and held off a late Memphis drive to claim a 35-29 victory in front of a Homecoming crowd of 17,593 fans at H.A. Chapman Stadium.

Josh Johnson's 63-yard touchdown reception and Anthony Watkins' 44-yard scoring run in the fourth quarter and Tulsa's defense was enough to hold off the Tigers from mounting a final quarter comeback. Watkins' run came with 4:28 left on the game clock, but Memphis closed the gap to six points 1:17 later.

On what amounted to their final drive, Memphis received the ball at their own 11yard line, converted on a big 4th-and-11 play for 12 yards to get to their own 42-yard line. On the very next play, Tulsa's Travon Fuller tipped a pass that was intercepted by Bryson Powers, ending Memphis' chance for a comeback.

On the night, the Hurricane defense forced three turnovers had three sacks and six pass breakups. Justin Wright led the way with 14 tackles, two TFL for -8 yards and forced one fumble, while Fuller added four stops, three breakups and one pickoff.

Shamari Brooks had a game-high 126 rushing yards and two touchdowns, while Davis Brin completed 11-of-21 passes for 182 yards and two TDs. Josh Johnson had his third 100+ receiving game in the last four contests with 140 yards on eight receptions.

Memphis ran 99 plays for 614 yards, while the Hurricane had 417 total yards on 67 offensive snaps. The Tigers missed three field goals and one PAT on the night.

Shamari Brooks' three-yard touchdown run with less than one minute in the game lifted Tulsa to a 32-31 comeback victory over South Florida on Saturday afternoon at Raymond James Stadium.

Tulsa overcame three offensive turnovers, a special teams touchdown by the Bulls and a double-digit deficit for the win. The final 0:47 of the game was the only time Tulsa led in posting its third comeback victory of the season.

With 4:20 remaining in the game, Tulsa took over possession at the USF 42-yard line after the Hurricane defense held the Bulls on 4thand-1. Tulsa had its own fourth down situation on 4th-and-3 from the USF 20-yard line, but Davis Brin completed a 6-yard pass to Josh Johnson for the first down. Brooks then took over, gaining five yards and six yards on the next two plays before scoring from three yards out for the game-winning touchdown.

Brooks finished with 145 yards and Deneric Prince added 110 yards on the ground for the Hurricane. Tulsa ended the game with a whopping 535 to 268-yard edge in total offense, while the Hurricane defense also held USF to 17 offensive points. The Bulls added a pick-6 and a 61-yard punt return for scores.

Despite two first-half interceptions, Brin completed 22-of-39 passes for 266 yards and two touchdowns.

The Tulsa defense put in another solid performance, holding USF to 113 rushing and 155 passing yards. Defensively, Justin Wright had a team-best seven tackles and a season-high 2.5 sacks for -9 yards, while Tyon Davis had a team-high three pass breakups.

After a first half that saw the teams tied at 3-3, the Navy option attack came alive after halftime and scored on its first three possessions for a 20-10 lead.

Tulsa began the second half with an Anthony Watkins 97-yard kickoff return to give Tulsa a 10-3 lead, but the Midshipmen went 75 yards in 10 plays to tie the score at 10.

When it looked like Tulsa would be taking a seven-point lead on a pass from Brin to Josh Johnson in the end zone late in the third quarter, the pass went through Johnson's arms and into the hands of defender Rayuan Lane. Navy rove 80 yards to take a 17-10 lead and added a 46-yard field goal on its next possession.

Tulsa made it interesting late when Davis Brin connected with JC Santana on a 43-yard pass to the one-yard line and two plays late hit Ezra Naylor II in the end zone for a 2-yard score, capping an 8-play, 65-yard drive with 2:21 remaining in the contest.

Tulsa's onside kick attempt failed as Navy took over at the 38-yard line to run out the game clock.

It was a defensive struggle in the first 30 minutes as the two teams combined for 292 yards, but 142 of them came on just two plays. Tulsa's Watkins had a 78-yard run and Navy's Carlinos Acie had 64 yards on a run from scrimmage.



Tulsa's comeback bid ended at the one-yard line as the nation's second-ranked Cincinnati Bearcats held off the Golden Hurricane for a 28-20 victory in front of 37,978 fans at Nippert Stadium.

It was a momentum-filled game as the Bearcats jumped out to the early 14-0 lead. Tulsa dominated the second quarter to make the halftime score 14-12. UC scored on its first two second-half possessions for a 28-12 lead, and the Hurricane came back with a dominating fourth quarter.

Tulsa outgained the Bearcats 446 to 390 yards in total offense and held a whopping 34:16 to 23:06 advantage in possession time. The Hurricane run game had its way with the country's No. 9-ranked defense by rushing for its second-highest total of the season with 297 yards.


Shamari Brooks and Anthony Watkins each had 100+ rushing yards as Brooks led the way with 132 yards and Watkins added 105 yards.

While Tulsa's offense had success on the ground the Hurricane defense held Cincinnati to well below its season rushing average with 116 yards, while forcing three turnovers.

Tulsa made the score 28.20 on a 21-yard pass from Brin to JuanCarlos Santana and two-point conversion at the 8:10 mark of the fourth quarter. From there, Tulsa's defense forced a Cincinnati punt and the offense marched to the UC 6-yard line and a 4thand-5 pass fell one yard short of the first down.

What looked to be the end for the Hurricane resulted in one more chance. Cincinnati fumbled the snap from their own 2-yard line on the first play with 1:11 on the clock. Tulsa again fell short on a 4th-and-1 from the one-yard line as the ball was fumbled into the end zone and recovered by the Bearcats to end the game.

Shamari Brooks scored on a 15-yard run in overtime to give Tulsa a 20-13 victory over the Tulane Green Wave in front of 22,784 fans at Yulman Stadium.

Ahead 13-3 late in the contest, Tulsa was looking to close out the game, but a Tulane offense that was stagnant all night, thanks to the Hurricane defensive unit, came to life. The Green Wave marched 95 yards in four plays and just 0:57 to make the score 13-10. Tulane recovered the onside kick and settled for the game-tying field goal on 4th-and-goal from the Tulsa six-yard line.

Now tied 13-13, Tulsa threw its third interception of the game with one minute on the game clock. Tulane took over from the Tulsa 24-yard line and looked to get an apparent come-from-behind victory but Merek Glover 's 26-yard field goal missed wide right.

Tulane won the overtime coin toss and elected to play defense first. It took the Hurricane just four plays to cross the goal line with Brooks carrying for the final 15 yards and a 20-13 lead after the Long's PAT.

As they did most of the day, the Hurricane defense stopped Tulane's opportunity to force a second OT when a Michael Pratt pass was broken up by Tyon Davis and fell incomplete on the 4th-and-10 play, securing the victory for Tulsa.



Tulsa scored a season-high for points in its 44-10 home finale victory over the Temple Owls in front of 16,731 fans at H.A. Chapman Stadium.

The Hurricane scored on its first four possessions for a 20-0 lead and five of its six first-half possessions to take a 27-0 lead over the Owls at halftime. Tulsa's first-half scoring drives covered 83, 73, 69 yards and two 42-yard drives.

At the intermission, the Hurricane out-gained Temple 306 to 98 total yards, while Davis Brin threw for over 200 yards in in the first 30 minutes for the third time this season.

Temple opened the scoring in the second half with a field goal and added a touchdown in the third period, while Tulsa added two touchdowns and a third field goal in the final half.

For the game, Tulsa outgained the Owls 513 to 293 yards, while gaining 297 through the air and 216 yards on the ground. The Hurricane defense held Temple to 293 yards and 2-of-14 on third downs.

Brin completed the game 18-of-30 for 297 yards and two touchdowns, while Josh Johnson caught nine of those passes for 159 yards and an eight-yard TD. BAME 12

Trailing 17.0, the Tulsa Golden Hurricane had its fourth comeback win of the season and 20th in the Philip Montgomery era with a 34-31 victory over the SMU Mustangs at Gerald J. Ford Stadium.

Tulsa improved to 6.6 on the season to become bowl eligible and 5.3 in the American Athletic Conference.

SMU jumped out to a 17-0 lead early in the second quarter, but the Hurricane cut its deficit to three points by halftime (17-14) with two touchdowns in the final 66 seconds.

The first Tulsa score came on a 10-play, 89yard drive that was capped by an Anthony Watkins' seven-yard run. After the Hurricane defense held the Mustangs to a 3-and-out, Tulsa's offense scored in 0:16 as Davis Brin threw 32 yards to Josh Johnson for the score.

The second half opened with Tulsa taking the kickoff 75 yards in nine plays for a 21-17 lead as Deneric Prince scored from one yard out. The Hurricane scored 10 more points before the Mustangs would get back on the scoreboard, the first was a Braylon Braxton nine-yard run and the second a 36-yard Zack Long field goal for a 31-17 lead.

The Mustangs got within a touchdown at 31-24 with 11:00 remaining. Long knocked through his second field goal of the quarter with a 27-yarder at the 4:06 mark for a 34-24 lead before SMU responded with a 69-yard drive to make the score 34-31 with 2:50 to play. Tulsa recovered the onside kick and ran out the clock for the victory.



PHILIP MONTGOMERY Tulsa Head Coach



Philip Montgomery culminates his seventh season at Tulsa with his fourth bowl appearance as the Golden Hurricane head coach.

After early close losses to Oklahoma State and Ohio State, Montgomery's 2021 team battled back to a 6.6 record by winning its final three contests. The Hurricane also took No. 2-ranked Cincinnati down to the wire, falling by eight points.

Montgomery guided the 2020 team to a regular season mark of 6-1 and Tulsa's 6-0 American Athletic Conference record put the Hurricane in the AAC Championship game against No. 8-ranked Cincinnati. The Hurricane received its first in-season national ranking since 2008, climbing to No. 18 in the Associated Press poll and finished the season in the Lockheed Martin Armed Forces Bowl.

After becoming Tulsa's 29th head football coach on December 11, 2014, Montgomery has brought excitement back to H.A. Chapman Stadium with his potent offensive style.

In his first season at Tulsa, Montgomery transformed a previous two-win team into a squad that won six games in 2015 to a 10-win team a year later. He led those first two teams to the Camping World Independence Bowl in 2015 and the Miami Beach Bowl in 2016, thus becoming only the fourth head coach in school history to take his first two teams to bowl games.

In year one, Tulsa's offense ranked among the nation's leaders for passing, scoring and total offense the entire season. The 2016 Hurricane squad finished the season among the nation's best for total offense (527.0), scoring (42.5), rushing (261.7) and passing (265.3). Tulsa's offense also established



an NCAA milestone in 2016, becoming the first team in FBS/ DI history with a 3,000-yard passer (Dane Evans), two 1,000yard rushers (James Flanders and D'Angelo Brewer) and two 1,000-yard receivers (Keevan Lucas and Josh Atkinson). Tulsa also established 11 individual school records on offense that year.

With a young roster, the Hurricane football team was so close to posting winning records in 2017, '18 and '19. Tulsa had nine losses in those three years by seven points or less with four decided on last second field goals and another in overtime.

Montgomery has compiled an overall 37-46 record in his seven seasons.

During Montgomery's tenure as a collegiate coach, the 2021 season is the 13th time that he has helped take a team to a bowl game.

Before coming to Tulsa, Montgomery logged nearly two decades of coaching experience, including seven seasons (2008-14) at Baylor University, where he served as the offensive coordinator in his final four years for the Big 12 powerhouse. His



start in the collegiate ranks came in 2003 when he coached running backs and quarterbacks at the University of Houston, serving there for five seasons.

In his college career, Montgomery has tutored several award-winning quarterbacks, including Big 12 Player of the Year Bryce Petty, Heisman Trophy winner Robert Griffin III, Baylor All-American Nick Florence, Conference USA MVP Kevin Kolb and Houston standout Case Keenum. At Tulsa, quarterback Dane Evans completed his career in 2016 as the school's all-time passing, total offense and TD passes leader under Montgomery's tutelage.

Prior to moving to the collegiate ranks, Montgomery served one year as the offensive coordinator at Denton (Texas) High School and helped that school compile a 10-2 record and the 2002 Bi-district crown. Before that, Montgomery was the quarterback and backfield coach at Stephenville High School for six seasons. He was an integral part of a program that won back-to-back Class 4A Division II state championships in 1998 and 1999.

A Texas native, Montgomery was four-year letterman at Tarleton State, where he received his bachelor's degree in exercise and sports studies in 1995.

Montgomery, 49, and his wife, Ashli, have two children: Cannon and Maci. Cannon is a senior football student-athlete at Tulsa and Maci is a junior member of the Golden Hurricane spirit squad.

TULSA ATHLETICS



Rick Dickson Vice President and Director of Athletics

Athletics has been a part of The University of Tulsa since its founding as Henry Kendall College in Muskogee, Oklahoma in 1894. During the next hundred years, the college moved to Tulsa, renamed itself for the new city which would eventually come to be known as the Oil Capital of the World. Football was the original sport at TU and others were added (and dropped) in the intervening years. Today, TU is home to 17 sports, including 10 women's and 7 men's and include men's and women's basketball, men's and women's cross country, football, men's and women's indoor track & field and outdoor track & field, men's and women's soccer, men's and women's tennis, women's golf, women's rowing, and women's vollevball.

Director of Athletics Tulsa is an NCAA Division I member for all sports. Tulsa is a current member of the American Athletic Conference, a league the school joined on July 1, 2014.

Tulsa has won six national championships, four in women's golf (1982 and 1988 NCAA; and 1980 and 1982 AIAW titles) and two in men's basketball (1981 and 2001 NIT). Golfers Nancy Lopez, Kathy Baker, and Melissa McNamara won individual national titles, while along with its four national titles Tulsa women's golf has finished as the national runners-up five times.

The University of Tulsa has three prestigious Rhodes Scholars in the school's history, and two have been athletes — in 1988, track athlete Peter Bednekoff was Tulsa's second Rhodes Scholar and first since 1957. In 2016-17, cross-country and track athlete Kirk Smith gave the University another Rhodes Scholar.

TU has the smallest undergraduate enrollment of all schools participating in the NCAA Football Bowl Sub-Division (FBS). The Golden Hurricane football team is making its 23rd bowl appearance in 2021, including 12 appearances in the last 19 seasons. Tulsa was the first school to ever appear in five straight New Year's

Day Bowl Games — the 1942 Sun Bowl, the 1943 Sugar Bowl, the 1944 Sugar Bowl, the 1945 Orange Bowl, and the 1946 Oil Bowl.

Tulsa's basketball program was founded in 1907, when the school still went by the name Henry Kendall College. In the modern era, the men's basketball team has had a history of success led by such notable coaches as Clarence Iba, Nolan Richardson, Tubby Smith, Bill Self and now Frank Haith. The program has made 25 national post-season appearances in the last 40 years with three Sweet 16 appearances, an Elite 8 finish in 2000, two NIT Championships and one CBA title.

The men's soccer program is coming off of a season where the team posted a 16-2-1 record, won the regular season and post-season league titles and advanced to the third round of the NCAA Tournament. Men's soccer has won a total of 13 conference championships and has participated in 12 NCAA tournaments, advancing twice to the elite-eight of the men's soccer championship. Tulsa's tennis programs have put together a string of success on both the men's and women's side, while playing in one of the nation's premier facilities, the Michael D. Case Tennis Center. For the men, eight conference titles and 18 NCAA tournament appearances, while advancing to the final 16 in 2011 and 2012. The women's team has made 14 NCAA tournaments in the last 21 years and has claimed eight conference championships.

Under long time Head Coach Steve Gulley, Tulsa's cross-country program has become as consistent as any sport in school history. The Hurricane men has won 11 straight conference titles and has finished among the top-6 at the NCAA Championship in each of the last three seasons, while the women have captured six conference titles since 2010.

The two newest programs in the history of the university is women's softball, which began in 1992-93, and the first year for women's rowing came in 1996-97. Tulsa's softball team has enjoyed huge success with 11 NCAA tournament appearances, 12 conference championships and more than 550 wins over the last 16 years.

Tulsa's athletic history is full of magical moments with outstanding team and individual performances, wins over marquee opponents, numerous All-Americans and conference championships.

THE NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP TROPHY

The College Football Playoff National Championship Trophy is the ultimate goal of college football teams across the United States.

An ascending virtual football, the trophy's handcrafted gold brackets surround a hardened steel core. The trophy was created to be raised in celebration of the highest level of team achievement in college football.

Designed by Pentagram, the trophy was commissioned for the new playoff era. The design features a focused football at the center of the base that rises to form an actual-size ball. Standing at a total height of three feet and weighing 23 pounds, the trophy and base are two integral but separate pieces, so the trophy may be lifted up independently when it is awarded at the championship game.

The trophy is handcrafted by the master fine art foundry Polich Tallix. Expert craftsmen worked for three months, combining cutting edge technologies with timeless metal casting and finishing techniques to create the trophy.

Handmade from 24k gold, bronze, and stainless steel, the trophy is 26.5 inches tall. The base is formed from bronze with a hand-rubbed black patina finish and is 12 inches high.
