





#### TODAY'S GAME



#### The Game

Marshall (8-4, 5-3 SBC) and UConn (6-6) meet in the third annual Myrtle Beach Bowl at Brooks Stadium in Conway, South Carolina. The game kicks off at 2:30 p.m. (ET) and will be televised by ESPN. Mike Morgan, Eric Mac Lain and Tera Talmadge will have the call.

Both teams will be making their first Myrtle Beach Bowl appearance.

Marshall brings a four-game winning streak to the Grand Strand after taking down SBC opponents Old Dominion, Appalachian State, Georgia Southern, and Georgia State to conclude their regular season, finishing third in the East Division standings. Their defense topped the conference with just over 16 points allowed per game and ranked second with under 293 yards allowed per game.

Following a one-win season in 2021, UConn became bowl eligible for the first time since 2015 with a win over No. 19 Liberty 36-33 on November 12th. The Huskies dominated their home schedule with a 5-1 record, their most wins at home since 2010. After starting their season 3-5, UConn defeated Boston College, UMass, then Liberty all at home to become bowl eligible.

#### The Series

This will be the second-ever meeting between Marshall and UConn. Previously, the two teams met in the 2015 St. Petersburg Bowl at Tropicana Field, which resulted in a 16-10 Thundering Herd victory.

#### **Marshall Bowl History**

The Thundering Herd will be making their 18th bowl game appearance with the 2022 Myrtle Beach Bowl, holding a 12-5 record. Marshall fell to Louisiana in the 2021 New Orleans Bowl 36-21 in their last bowl game appearance.

Marshall made their bowl debut in the 1997 Motor City Bowl, falling to Ole Miss 34-31 in Pontiac, Michigan. With their appearance in this year's Myrtle Beach Bowl, the Thundering Herd have been to six-straight bowl games, holding a 2-3 record since 2017.

#### **UConn Bowl History**

The Huskies will be making their seventh bowl game appearance and first since falling to Marshall in the 2015 St. Petersburg Bowl. Overall, UConn posts a 3-3 record in bowl games, with their last win coming in the 2010 PapaJohns.com Bowl over South Carolina.

UConn made their bowl debut in the 2004 Motor City Bowl with a 39-10 victory over Toledo in Detroit, Michigan. Most notably, the Huskies took part in the 2011 Tostitos Fiesta Bowl with a 48-20 loss to No. 9 Oklahoma in Glendale, Arizona.

#### Myrtle Beach Bowl History

The inaugural Myrtle Beach Bowl was held on Dec. 21, 2020, and featured a 56-28 victory for Appalachian State (SBC) over North Texas (C-USA) at Brooks Stadium. Mountaineers' running back Cameron Peoples set the all-time NCAA bowl game record with 317 rushing yards and five touchdowns in the win.


Last year, Tulsa (AAC) defeated Old Dominion (C-USA) 30-17 on December 21, 2021, at Brooks Stadium. Golden Hurricane quarterback Davis Brin threw for 285 yards and two touchdowns and was named MVP after the game.







#### Herd Streaking into Myrtle Beach Bowl

Marshall heads into the third Myrtle Beach Bowl winners of four consecutive games to end the regular season.

The Thundering Herd closed out the regular season with wins over Old Dominion, Appalachian State, Georgia Southern and Georgia State to finish at 8-4.

Marshall's defense has led the way in 2022, ranking seventh nationally with just 16.2 points per game allowed and is top 10 in the country in rushing defense, turnovers gained, interceptions, sacks, first downs allowed and are the national leader in third down defense.

#### **Huskies Bowling for the First Time Since 2015**

It's been seven years since the UConn football team was in a bowl game, a fact that changes with the 2022 Myrtle Beach Bowl.

The Huskies won five of their final seven games after starting the season 1-4 to reach bowl eligibility. The Myrtle Beach Bowl will be the first postseason game for UConn since the 2015 St. Petersburg Bowl, also against Marshall.

The Huskies became bowl eligible with their upset win at home over No. 19 nationally ranked Liberty, 36-33.

#### **UConn's All-New England Selections**

UConn senior cornerback Tre Wortham (Stockton, CA) and junior linebacker Jackson Mitchell (Ridgefield, CT) were named to the New England Football Writers 2022 University Division All-New England team.

Both Mitchell and Wortham have been key cogs in the Husky defense all season and helped fuel a unit that ranked 31st nationally in turnovers gained (20) and 54th in turnover margin. Mitchell is first in the country with five fumble recoveries. He is also a 2022 Butkus Award semifinalist and is second in the nation with 133 total tackles on the season.

Wortham ranked 16th in the country with a team-leading four picks on the year. He finished with a career-high 38 tackles on the season and a team-best nine passes defended.



# **WELCOME TO BROOKS STADIUM**



The Coastal Carolina University football stadium officially opened as Brooks Stadium on Sept. 6, 2003, for the inaugural home game of the Chanticleer football program. Scoring a touchdown with just seconds left on the clock, the Chanticleers defeated Newberry College 21-14.

With a gift from the late businessman Bob Brooks, the stadium was named in honor of Brooks' children Coby Garrett and Boni Belle. The \$2 million gift was among the largest gifts ever made to the University.

Brooks, who grew up on a farm in Loris, S.C., was the CEO and founder of Eastern

Foods, Inc., creators of the Naturally Fresh line of products, and chairman of Hooters of America, Inc. He also created Hooters Air Charter Airline, the National Golf Association Hooters Tour and the Hooters ProCup Series, a series of short-track races in small towns throughout the Southeast and Midwest. Brooks died in 2006.

Phase I of the stadium construction included 6,408 seats, while Phase II added almost 1,000 additional seats prior to the 2006 season. The third phase of Brooks Stadium was completed in 2010 when approximately 1,600 seats were added directly behind the north end zone. Affectionately referred to as



the Chantourage section, the seating directly in front of the field house was designated as the student section in 2011.

Brooks Stadium has been ranked among the top stadiums in the nation in attendance based on capacity. In 2010, the Chanticleers hosted a first-round NCAA Division I Football Championship playoff game against Western Illinois. The game marked the first postseason game played in Brooks Stadium.

On Feb. 15, 2013, the women's lacrosse team opened its inaugural season on its new home field inside Brooks Stadium. Women's lacrosse was the 18th Division I sports program for the Chanticleers.

The facility underwent a major transformation in the spring of 2015 as Benton Field went from natural grass to artificial teal turf ... or "The Surf Turf." The first pieces of Powerblade SD turf were laid on April 2 and the project

was completed later that month. The project had a budget of \$1.2 million.

Brooks Stadium was designed and built with the capability to expand from its inception. That original design is coming to fruition as Coastal embarked on another two-phase expansion in the spring of 2017 that will ultimately bring the capacity to approximately 20,000.

The first phase boosted the seating capacity to at 15,000 and included adding seats to both corners of the end zone nearest the field house, expanding the sections closest to the field on both sides toward the scoreboard, and expanding the upper deck on the east side to match the length of the lower deck.

Prior to the 2019 season, a second level and premium suites were completed on the west side to increase the capacity to 20,000. The cost of the two-phase project was \$31.8 million.

## "SURF TURF" HOSTS MYRTLE BEACH BOWL

A total of eight colleges and universities throughout the United States uniquely colored turf. The "Surf Turf" is the home to the Coastal Carolina Chanticleers football team on the campus of Coastal Carolina University and the location of the Myrtle Beach Bowl. The teal-colored turf is just the second in the history of the NCAA Football Bowl Series (FBS) to host a post-season bowl on a non-traditional colored surface.

Brooks Stadium is no a stranger to post-season play as the Chanticleers hosted a first-round NCAA Division I Football Championship playoff game against Western Illinois, in 2010. Coastal hosted three more playoff contests between the 2013 and 2014 seasons all on natural grass. In January of 2015, the renovation began for the transformation from natural grass to the teal turf. By early April, the first pieces of the new "Teal Turf" were laid receiving attention to numerous national news outlets, USA Today, Yahoo!, CBS, and FOX.


Boise State's Albertson's Stadium became the first non-traditional colored surface to host a post-season bowl game when the Big West Conference lost its lone affiliation with the Vegas Bowl. The Big West came up with the idea of creating it owns bowl in 1997 and the

Broncos volunteered to host the inaugural Sports Humanitarian Bowl with a match up of Utah State and Cincinnati. Over the years, the bowl name has changed from the Sports Humanitarian Bowl to the now Famous Idaho Potato Bowl.

On November 13, 2018, ESPN Events partnered with the city of Myrtle Beach to create the Myrtle Beach Bowl Game to be played on the campus of Coastal Carolina University beginning in 2020. Coastal Carolina's "Surf Turf" becomes the second non-traditional colored playing surface to host a FBS bowl game. The Myrtle Beach Bowl will feature a match-up of two teams from one of three conferences (Sun Belt, Mid-American, and Conference USA).

In the inaugural year 2020, the first match-up featured teams from the Sun Belt and Conference USA as Appalachian State took on North Texas. The second annual Myrtle Beach Bowl featured Old Dominion and Tulsa. The third Myrtle Beach Bowl between Marshall and UConn will take place December 19, 2022 on ESPN with a kickoff scheduled for 2:30 p.m. ET.







# APPALACHIAN STATE 56, NORTH TEXAS 28

The inaugural Myrtle Beach Bowl will be remembered as a record-setting day for Appalachian State sophomore running back Cameron Peoples.

The Lineville, Ala., native had 29 carries for 317 yards and five rushing touchdowns in the 56-28 win over North Texas at Brooks Stadium. Peoples set the all-time NCAA bowl record with 317 rushing yards and five rushing touchdowns. He scored on runs of 3, 64, 62, 4, and 11 yards for the Mountaineers.

Peoples broke the single-game bowl record for most rushing yards, previously held by Georgia Tech's PJ Daniels, who had 307 rushing yards against Tulsa in the 2004 Humanitarian Bowl.

Peoples also became the seventh player in NCAA history to score five rushing touchdowns in a bowl game. Toledo's Kareem Hunt (2014 GoDaddy.com) and Barry Sanders (1988 Holiday Bowl) are two of the notable names on the list.

Appalachian State (9-3) became the fourth team in NCAA history to rush for 500 or more yards in a bowl game. The Mountaineers ran the ball 49 times for 502 yards and six rushing touchdowns in the win. ASU's 502 rushing yards are the fourth-most by a team in NCAA bowl history.



Peoples wasn't the only ASU player that found success on the ground against the Mean Green. Senior running back Marcus Williams, Jr., recorded 101 rushing yards and one touchdown on six carries. He scored on a 70-yard run to push ASU's lead to 28-7 with 2:29 left in the first half.

Peoples and Williams combined for 420 rushing yards, the second-highest rushing total by a pair of teammates in NCAA bowl history. Baylor's Johnny Jefferson (299) and Devin Chafin (161) combined for 460 rushing yards against North Carolina in the 2015 Russell Athletic Bowl.

North Texas (4-6) had success on the ground as well. The Mean Green ran the ball 59 times for 242 yards. Tre Siggers had 17 carries for 120 yards, while teammate Oscar Adaway added 26 carries for 97 yards and one touchdown.

ASU (502) and North Texas (242) combined for 742 rushing yards, the fourth-most combined rushing yards in NCAA bowl history.

Appalachian State scored on five touchdowns of seven first-half possessions to take a 35-14 halftime lead.







# TULSA 30, OLD DOMINION 17

The Tulsa Golden Hurricane (7-6) passed for 285 yards and rushed for 244 more in a 30-17 win over the Old Dominion Monarchs (6-7) in the second edition of the Myrtle Beach Bowl on Monday evening. Tulsa's offense held the ball for just under 40 minutes in the program's 11th bowl game victory.

Tulsa finished off their season with four consecutive wins, while Old Dominion dropped their first game since October 16th and saw their five-game winning streak snapped. The postseason matchup was the first-ever meeting between the two teams.

Golden Hurricane quarterback Davis Brin completed 22 of 34 passes for 285 yards and two touchdowns in the victory. The redshirt junior was named Myrtle Beach Bowl MVP following the game after setting a Myrtle Beach Bowl game record for passing yards.

Brin connected with senior receiver Josh Johnson for eight receptions and 129 yards, including a 23-yard touchdown catch in the opening quarter. Redshirt senior receiver JuanCarlos Santana added six catches for 75 yards, while redshirt sophomore tight end Ethan Hall caught a four-yard touchdown pass for his lone reception of the night. Senior running back Shamari Brooks rushed for 109 yards on 26 carries and a touchdown to help the attack.



After surrendering a 100-yard kickoff return to begin the game, the Golden Hurricane defense gave up just 10 more points the rest of the game and held Old Dominion to only 71 rushing yards in the contest. Graduate student linebacker Yohance Burnett led the team in tackles with six total, with senior defensive lineman Jaxon Player added the team's only sack with his five total tackles.

Graduate student kicker Zack Long knocked in field goals of 25, 32, and 35 yards to set a new season high.

Old Dominion tallied 247 yards of total offense and converted five of their 11 third downs in their second-ever bowl appearance. Monarchs' redshirt freshman quarterback Hayden Wolff threw for 176 yards on 19 completions and one interception in the defeat. Sophomore wide receiver Ali Jennings III was Wolff's favorite target with six receptions for 74 yards. Redshirt sophomore running back Blake Watson led the rushing attack with 77 yards on 14 carries and a two-yard touchdown.

Freshman linebacker Jason Henderson led the Monarch defense with nine solo tackles and season-high and 13 total, with redshirt junior safety R'Tarriun Johnson also collecting 13 stops setting a Myrtle Beach Bowl record for tackles. Senior linebacker Jordan Young posted his second sack of the year and was a force in the Golden Hurricane backfield with three tackles for loss.












# JIM MORA UConn Head Coach





"Jim is a proven winner, a man of integrity, and he possesses the experience and the energy to lead our football program back to success," said David Benedict, UConn Director of Athletics. "Jim is excited and undaunted by this challenge, and we both know that this program has great potential. I'm certain that, under Coach Mora's leadership, UConn football will once again realize that potential."

Mora, 60, brings 31 years of coaching experience in both the college ranks and the NFL to Storrs. He has 10 years of head coaching experience, including six as the head coach of UCLA where he accumulated a 46-30 overall record and a 29-24 mark in Pac-12 play. Mora led the Bruins to the 2012 Pac-12 South Championship and won the 2013 Sun Bowl and 2014 Alamo Bowl. The Bruins were ranked as high as No. 7 nationally during the 2014 and 2015 seasons.

Under Mora, 30 Bruins were selected in the NFL Draft, including at least one first rounder in every year except one. The 30 NFL Draft selections were the most of any Pac-12 program during that time.

A 1983 graduate of the University of Washington, Mora took over for Mike Holmgren as head coach of the Seattle Seahawks in 2009. He had served as assistant head coach and defensive backs coach for Seattle in the 2007 and 2008 campaigns. The Seahawks went 10-6 and finished first in the NFC West in the 2007 season and won the Wild Card game in the playoffs.





In his initial season as the head coach of the Atlanta Falcons in 2004, Mora directed the team to an 11-5 record, becoming just the eighth rookie head coach in NFL history to win 11 games and the 11th to bring home a division title. The Falcons captured the NFC South title and earned an appearance in the NFC Championship Game for only the second time in franchise history. Mora was honored as the NFC Coach of the Year following the 2004 season.

Prior to becoming the head coach for the Falcons, Mora served on the San Francisco 49ers coaching staff from 1997-2003. He spent his last five seasons in San Francisco as the defensive coordinator. In his first year, the 49ers finished No. 1 in the NFL in total defense, No. 2 in pass defense (25 interceptions), takeaways (41) and run defense, as well as finishing No. 3 in the league in sacks (54).

The 1998 squad tied for No. 1 in the NFC and No. 4 in the NFL in interceptions, with 21. In the 2002 and 2003 seasons with San Francisco, the defense finished no lower than fourth in the NFL versus the run, and in 2003 produced 42 sacks, to tie for second in the conference. The 1997 team advanced to the NFC Championship Game and had three defensive players voted to the Pro Bowl, while the 1998 and 2002 squads captured Wild Card Game wins.



From 1992-1996, Mora worked on the staff of his father, James E. Mora, as the secondary coach with the New Orleans Saints. The Saints put together the No. 1 pass defense in the league during Mora's first two years with the team.

In 1985, Mora broke into the NFL coaching ranks with the San Diego Chargers under head coach Don Coryell. He spent seven seasons with the Chargers, advancing from the league's first quality control coaching position to defensive backs coach, while working for head coaches Coryell, Al Saunders and Dan Henning.

NFL Pro Bowlers who have played under coach Mora over the years include -- Julian Peterson, LB-Seattle and San Francisco; Marcus Trufant, DB-Seattle; Allen Rossum, DB-Atlanta; Patrick Kerney, DL-Atlanta; Roderick Coleman, DL-Atlanta; Keith Brooking, LB-Atlanta; DeAngelo Hall, DB-Atlanta; Michael Vick, QB-Atlanta; Alge Crumpler, TE-Atlanta; Warrick Dunn, RB-Atlanta; Bryant Young, DL-San Francisco; Lance Schulters, DB-San Francisco; Merton Hanks, DB-San Francisco; Eric Allen, DB-New Orleans; Tyrone Hughes, DB-New Orleans; Gill Byrd, DB-San Diego, Anthony Barr, LB-Minnesota.

Mora began his coaching career in 1984 at the University of Washington. While at UW, Mora had the opportunity to be a part of two Rose Bowl teams as a player (1981-loss to Michigan; 1982-win over lowa), and helped the Huskies land a berth in the 1985 Orange Bowl (win over Oklahoma) as a graduate assistant coach. During his five seasons in the Husky program, Washington compiled a 48-12 overall record

UConn sophomore running back Nate Carter ran for a career-high 190 yards on 20 carries as the Huskies came up short in the 2022 season opener, 31-20 to Utah State at Merlin Olsen Field at Maverik Stadium in Logan, Utah.

The Huskies jumped out to a 14-0 lead thanks to a big first quarter before the Utah State offense rang off 24-unanswered points to close the first half. A stingy defensive effort kept the Huskies in the game into the fourth quarter where a pair of sophomore Noe Ruelas field goals pulled UConn to withing 24-20 with 10:09 to go in the game.

The Aggies answered as quarterback Logan Bonner capped a 13 play, 75-yard drive with his third touchdown throw of the game, hitting Brian Cobbs in the back right corner of the endzone to push the lead to 31-20. Utah State's defense sealed the win away with their second interception of the day with 4:46 left.

Bonner led the Aggies offense to 542 total yards, throwing for 281 yards on 20-of-29 passes. On the ground, Tyler Calvin, Jr. finished with 161 yards on 33 carries while Robert Briggs ran for 85 on 10 touches with a touchdown.

For UConn, freshman quarterback Zion Turner finished his first career game going 12 for 31 for 109 yards, a touchdown and two interceptions. The Huskies finished with 364 total yards, 245 coming on the ground. Defensively, UConn linebacker Jackson Mitchell finished with 16 total tackles, a sack, a forced fumble and a fumble recovery. Senior lan Swenson posted 12 tackles while r-sophomore Malik Dixon-Williams made 11 stops.



For the second-straight week, UConn sophomore running back Nathan Carter topped 100-yards rushing as the Huskies piled up 274 yards on the ground en route to a 28-3 win over in-state foe Central Connecticut at Pratt & Whitney Stadium at Rentschler Field.

The Huskies notch their first victory of the season and the first for first-year head coach Jim Mora at UConn. UConn improves to 19-2 against FCS opponents since 2002 in dealing the Blue Devils a loss in their season opener.

The UConn defense allowed just three points in the win, the fewest points allowed since a 2015 win at Tulane (7-3). CCSU finished with just 242 total yards of offense with just 78 yards rushing.

Carter paced the offense with 123 yards coming on 23 carries and a third quarter touchdown, his first of the season. Carter also hauled in one pass for 18 yards in the win. Classmate Brian Brewton carried 10 times for 62 yards.

In the air, true freshman Zion Turner made his first career start and completed 14-of-22 passes for 172 yards and a pair of touchdowns with an interception. Sophomore tight end Brandon niemenski and r-sophomore Jacob Flynn each caught touchdowns in the win.

Junior Jackson Mitchell led the defense with seven tackles, five solo while grad student Brandon Bouyer-Randle recorded his first career interception in the win.



Syracuse junior quarterback Garrett Shrader threw for 287 yards and three touchdowns and ran two more in to lead the Orange past the UConn Huskies, 48-14, at Pratt & Whitney Stadium at Rentschler Field.

The Syracuse signal caller finished the night completing 20-of-23 passes with touchdown throws of 47, 18 and 39 yards in the win. Sophomore running back Sean Tucker carried it 27 times for 112 yards and a score for the Orange.

UConn was held to 187 yards of total offense in the loss, just 92 through the air and 10 first downs. Sophomore running back Nathan Carter led the Huskies with 71 yards rushing on 16 carries. Sophomore Devontae Houston recorded his first career touchdown, a 28-yard second quarter run for six.

Freshman quarterback Zion Turner completed 14-of-17 throws for 92 yards and a score, a 56-yard hook-up with sophomore Aaron Turner in the third quarter, his first career touchdown catch.

Syracuse scored on all five of their possessions in the first half, held the ball for 20:05 and outgained the Huskies 309-105 in building a 27-7 lead at the half. The Orange set the tone for the first half right off the opening kick-off, putting together a 12-play, 69-yard drive capped by a one-yard plunge from quarterback Shrader.

Syracuse finished with 465 total yards of offense and 29 first downs.

The UConn defense was led by junior Jackson Mitchell who matched his career-high in tackles for the second time this season, making 16 stops and adding a half sack.





Michigan running back Blake Corum ran for five touchdowns as the No. 4 nationally ranked Wolverines dealt the visiting UConn Huskies a 59-0 loss in front of 109,639 at Michigan Stadium.

The Huskies were held scoreless for the first time this season and first time since a 49-0 loss at home to Purdue last fall. UConn had just 110 yards of total offense and six first downs in the loss.

Freshman quarterback Zion Turner was the Huskies leading rusher with 42 yards on seven carries. Turner completed just 4-of-16 passes for 17 yards on the day. Fellow true freshman Victor Rosa had a career-high 14 carries.

Defensively, junior linebacker Jackson Mitchell led the Huskies with 10 tackles, his third game this season with double-digit stops. Junior Eric Watts and grad student Brandon Bouyer-Randle each recorded a sack, their firsts of the season.

Michigan finished with 465 yards of total offense, picked-up 26 first downs and converted on all eight of their trips into the red-zone, seven for touchdowns. Corum carried the ball 12 times for 71 yards while Michigan starting quarterback J.J. McCarthy finished 15-of-18 for 214 yards in the win.

The Wolverine defense forced 10 punts, held UConn to just 2-of-14 on third down and let the Huskies over midfield just once on 13 drives. Corum scored four of his five touchdowns in the first half as the Wolverines built a 38-0 lead into halftime.



NC State quarterback Devin Leary threw for 320 yards and four touchdowns to lead the No. 12 nationally ranked Wolfpack past the UConn Huskies, 41-10, in front of 56,919 at Carter-Finley Stadium.

The Huskies drop their third-straight, losing to a Top-25 nationally ranked program for the second-consecutive week. UConn freshman running back Victor Rosa carried six times for 43 yards and a touchdown in the loss. Freshman quarterback Zion Turner completed 10-of-12 passes but for just 39 yards.

NC State put together 492 yards of total offense, 323 in the air, 29 first downs while going 10-for-14 on third down. Defensively, the Wolfpack kept the Huskies under wraps to the tune of 160 yards of total offense, just 2-fo-12 on the third down and eight total first downs.

The Wolfpack wasted no time jumping on the scoreboard, scoring 14 seconds into the game as Leary connected with Thayer Thomas for a 75-yard score on their first play from scrimmage. Leary commanded the NC State offense to scores on their first five drives, 357 yards of total offense, to 56 yards for the Huskies, while holding the ball for 20:01 en route to a 31-3 halftime lead.

UConn sophomore safety Durante Jones turned in a career-high 13 tackles while r-sophomore Malik Dixon-Williams made 11 stops, matching his career-high. Linebacker Bouyer-Randle finished with nine tackles to go with an interception.



UConn sophomore running back Devontae Houston capped a 100-yard rushing day with the go-ahead touchdown with 2:20 left in the fourth quarter to lift the Huskies to a 19-14 win over visiting Fresno State at Pratt & Whitney Stadium at Rentschler Field.

The Huskies snapped a three-game slide and earned the programs first-ever win over a team from the Mountain West conference. The UConn defense led the way, holding the Bulldogs to 187 total yards of offense, 157 through the air and 30 yards on the ground, all season-lows. The Bulldogs were 0-for-7 on third down and 0-for-2 on fourth down while the Huskies finished with two sacks, 6.0 tackles for a loss while forcing three turnovers, a season-best.

Houston finished with a career best 105 yards, his first career 100-yard effort, on 23 carries.

Fresno State took a 7-6 lead into halftime before returning the second half kick-off to their 38-yard line, needing just five plays to cover 62 yards with Jordan Mims plunging in from a yard out to put the Bulldogs up 14-6 early in the third quarter. From there, the UConn defense took over, keeping Fresno off the scoreboard, getting an interception, and forcing three-straight punts to give the Husky offense a chance.

UConn freshman quarterback Zion Turner hit sophomore Aaron Turner for a five-yard score at 5:18 in the third, but the two-point try failed leaving the Huskies trailing 14-12 into the fourth. The Huskies converted three third downs on a 94-yard drive that Houston capped off breaking off right tackle and scampering up the sidelines for a 17-yard score for a 19-14 lead with 2:18 left. The Husky defense took over, forcing a turnover on downs as junior linebacker Jackson Mitchell created a fourth-and-13 with a sack on third down.





The UConn Huskies ran for a season-high 295 yards to go on the road and post a 33-12 win at FIU in Miami, FL. Sophomore Devontae Houston ran for a career-best 135 yards and freshman Victor Rosa also had a career-high with 89 yards and two scores to pace the Husky rushing attack.

The Huskies won their second-straight and ended an 11-game road losing streak with the victory in Miami. UConn posts back-to-back victories for the first time since the 2017 season.

The Huskies created three FIU turnovers in the first half and turned them into 17 points on their way to building a 20-0 lead at the half. UConn came into the game averaging 167.7 yards rushing and in the first half Saturday night rang up 172 on the ground led by Houston. The sophomore running back had 132 of his 135 yards on 11 carries in the first half but was forced from the game with an injury at the beginning of the third quarter. The Huskies scored on all-four of their trips to the red-zone in the first half with Rosa capping off a pair of 11-play drives with touchdown runs.

Senior defensive back Tre Wortham had two interceptions in the first half, the second with 47 seconds left to set up a Noe Ruelas field goal to end the half.

UConn quarterback Zion Turner finished the game 14-for-19 for 102 yards with fellow freshman Justin Joly and sophomore Aaron Turner each hauling in five passes. The Huskies held the ball for 34:15 and finished with 402 yards of total offense. UConn scored points on all five of their trips in to the redzone.



Ball State running back Carson Steele ran for 179 yards on 33 carries and scored three touchdowns, the last giving the Cardinals their first lead with 2:40 left in the game to complete a second half comeback and deal the visiting UConn Huskies a 25-21 loss at Scheumann Field.

The Huskies built a 21-10 lead at the half but were held scoreless in the second half as the Cardinals offense was fueled by Steele who had 133 of his 179 yards to lead the way. UConn grad student running back Robert Burns finished with 71 yards rushing on 11 carries, both new career-highs, while scoring his first career touchdown.

Ball State finished with 209 yards on the ground and dominated in the fourth quarter, scoring 12 points, running 28 plays for 131 yards, 93 on the ground, while holding the ball for 9:33. Defensively, they held the Huskies just 10 total yards over the final 15 minutes.

Quarterback Zion Turner finished 18-for-22 for 129 yards, two touchdowns and an interception. Freshman Victor Rosa had 72 yards on 17 carriers while Aaron Turner caught eight passes, a career-high, for 56 yards and a score.



UConn junior linebacker Jackson Mitchell turned in a dominant defensive performance to lead the Huskies to a 13-3 win over Boston College on Homecoming Weekend at Pratt & Whitney Stadium at Rentschler Field.

Mitchell finished the game with 12 tackles, a sack and an interception while also forcing a fumble and recovering a fumble to lead a UConn defense that held BC to just three points and 76 yards rushing. The Huskies posted five sacks on the afternoon and turned the Eagles over five times in the win.

UConn posted the program's first-ever win over Boston College in 15 head-to-head matchups and ended an eight-game losing streak against teams from the ACC, dating back to the 2016 season.

Mitchell and the UConn defense sealed the win in the fourth quarter. Leading 10-3, UConn's Mitchell forced a fumble to set the Huskies up on the BC 32-yard line, leading to a 43-yard Ruelas field goal for a 13-3 lead with 6:26 left.

On BC's next drive, Mitchell picked-off quarterback Emmett Morehead to halt an Eagle drive at the UConn 28. The Huskies were forced to punt on the next drive, but Mitchell came up big again, recovering a fumble by Zay Flowers with 4:06 left to put the stamp on a dominant defensive day.

UConn junior safety Durante Jones finished with eight tackles and an interception, his first on the season. Jones and the rest of the UConn secondary held BC standout receiver Zay Flowers to just two catches for 35 yards, a season low. R-Freshman Pryce Yates had seven tackles, 4.0 for a loss, and 2.5 sacks, while also forcing a fumble.





UConn freshman running back Victor Rosa ran for 87 yards and a pair of touchdowns to lead the Huskies to a 27-10 win over New England rival Massachusetts at Pratt & Whitney Stadium at Rentschler Field.

Rosa fueled a UConn rushing attack that piled up 274 yards in the win and his two scores gives him a team-best six touchdowns on the year. Sophomore Devontae Houston had 84 yards on seven carries including a 75-yard touchdown run in the first quarter, the longest scoring play for the Huskies this season.

UConn put together a two-minute drill to close the first half up 13·10. Rosa and the UConn defense took over in the second half to seal away the win. Rosa ran for 73 of his gamehigh 87 yards in the second half, including both of his touchdowns, a five-yard plunge in the third and a 12-yard run in the fourth quarter with 6:64 left to put the Huskies up 27·10.

The Husky defense held the Minutemen scoreless over the final 30 minutes as sophomore Durante Jones led the way with a career-high 14 tackles and a forced fumble. Junior linebacker Jackson Mitchell had eight tackles and a fumble recovery, his fourth of the season. Senior Tre Wortham got his fourth interception on the season in the win.

UConn freshman quarterback Zion Turner hit r-sophomore Kevens Clercius for a 30-yard go-ahead touchdown with 5:43 left as the Huskies knocked-off No. 19 nationally ranked Liberty University at Pratt & Whitney Stadium at Rentschler Field.

The Huskies won their third-straight and fourth in-a-row at home to become bowl eligible for the first-time since the 2015 season. UConn's six wins is their most since going 6-7 in 2015 and their 5-1 record at home this season is the most wins at home since a 6-0 campaign in 2010.

UConn also snapped a 10-game losing streak against nationally ranked opponents dating back to 2015 (W, 20-17 vs. #13 Houston).

The Husky defense helped set up the goahead score as they stopped Liberty on fourth-and-one at their 45 with 8:40 left. Linebacker Jackson Mitchell dropped Malik Caper for a four-yard loss on a swing pass. Six-plays later, Turner found Clercius in the endzone from 30-yards out and followed with the two-point try to Keelan Marion for a 36-33 lead. UConn forced a three-and-out punt and after failing on their own fourth-down try, ended the game on defense by turning over Liberty on downs with 41 seconds left.

Grad-student fullback Robert Burns rackedup a career-high 104 yards on 11 carries and scored a touchdown. It was his first career 100-yard game. Freshman Victor Rosa ran for 62 yards and a pair of touchdowns.

On defense, UConn's Eric Watts finished with six tackles and 1.5 sacks and forced a fumble. Senior lan Swenson posted 11 tackles. Quarterback Zion Turner finished the game 15-for-21 for 103 yards, a touchdown and an interception. Sophomore Aaron Turner caught a career-high 10 passes for 66 yards.

From there it was all Army with Murphy ripping off a 75-yard run for six on the first play of the Black Knight's ensuing drive and never trailed again.

Defensively, junior linebacker Jackson Mitchell matched his career-high with 16 tackles in the loss, giving him a career-best 133 for the season. Fellow linebacker Brandon Bouyer-Randle made a career-best 13 tackles.

Marshall's first football game as a member of the Sun Belt Conference would, naturally, include a long list of firsts.


Caleb McMillan recorded the first touch of the Sun Belt era. Kicker Rece Verhoff scored the first points. Local product — Poca's Ethan Payne — scored the first touchdown. Later, Payne became the first to produce a multi-TD effort in the SBC. First defensive score: Owen Porter, another locally grown Thundering Herd football player.

By the time Marshall had concluded its opening game, it was nothing but sunshine. The Herd easily handled Norfolk State, 55-3, in front of 24,607 at Joan C. Edwards Stadium

Verhoff — a 30-yard field goal — and Payne's 45-yard touchdown run took care of Marshall's scoring in the first quarter before a four-TD breakout in the second period. First-time starter Khalan Laborn, in place of All-American Rasheen Ali, scored the first of his two touchdowns on a 4-yard run to begin the second quarter. Porter's 21-yard scoop-and-score fumble return widened the margin to 24-0. Then, first-time starting quarterback Henry Colombi found receiver Corey Gammage for his first passing TD in a Marshall uniform. Colombi capped the quarter's scoring with a 7-yard run to make it 38-0 at intermission.

The second half was more of the same. Laborn scored on a 22-yard run with 12:51 left of the third quarter to make it 45-0, and then freshman tight end Toby Payne joined his brother's scoring party with an 11-yard touchdown reception a few minutes later.

Verhoff's second field goal, a 27-yarder, rounded out the scoring for the Herd. From there, Huff shifted his focus to gaining experience for newcomers. Overall, Marshall played six different quarterbacks, including four on one particular drive.



Marshall notched one of the biggest wins in its history by going to South Bend, Indiana, and toppling No. 8 Notre Dame, 26-21, before a crowd of 77,622 at Notre Dame Stadium. The only time Marshall has beaten a higher-ranked team was in 2003, when the Thundering Herd won 27-20 at No. 6 Kansas State.

The Thundering Herd out-gained Notre Dame 364 yards to 351 and out-rushed the Fighting Irish 219 yards to 130. Running back Khalan Laborn carried the football 31 times for 163 yards, including Marshall's first touchdown of the contest

Marshall played a turnover-free game while the Thundering Herd defense intercepted three Fighting Irish passes.

Marshall led the game 9-7 at halftime and 12-7 after three quarters before Notre Dame went up 15-12 on a one-yard quarterback sneak by Tyler Buchner, who then scored again on the two-point conversion.

The Thundering Herd regained the lead on a 3-yard touchdown pass from quarterback Henry Colombi to tight end Devin Miller with 5:16 left in the fourth quarter, then extended the lead to 26-15 when corneback Steven Gilmore intercepted a Buchner pass and returned it 37 yards for a touchdown.

Notre Dame cut the Marshall advantage to 26-21 on a touchdown pass with 14 seconds left but failed on a 2-point conversion try. The last chance for the Fighting Irish ended when Marshall's Corey Gammage recovered the Notre Dame onside kick.



Bowling Green celebrated the school's 100th homecoming game with a 34-31 overtime victory in front of a crowd of 21,158 at Doyt Perry Stadium.

Marshall jumped to a 14-0 lead after only two minutes and 32 seconds of play in the first quarter on two touchdown passes by quarterback Henry Colombi, the first covering 51 yards to wide receiver Corey Gammage and the second 78 yards to wide receiver Caleb McMillan.

Bowling Green scored its first points of the game on a 25-yard touchdown pass from Matt McDonald to wide receiver Odieu Hiliare at the 12:30 mark of the second quarter, but Marshall answered immediately to go back up by 14 points when running back Khalan Laborn capped a 9-play, 69-yard drive with a 5-yard touchdown run. BGSU, however, rallied to tie the game before halftime on two more McDonald touchdown passes - 27 yards to Hiliare and 30 yards to wide receiver Cavon Croom.

The game remained tied 21-21 through the third quarter, then Bowling Green took its first lead of the contest on a 1-yard run by Harold Fannin at the 12:30 mark of the fourth quarter. The Thundering Herd tied the game on the second touchdown of the evening by Laborn, an 8-yard run with 5:43 left in the fourth quarter. The game remained tied 28-28 through regulation play.

Bowling Green won the overtime coin toss and elected to start on defense. Marshall's Rece Verhoff kicked a career-long 38-yard field goal on the Herd's overtime possession. Bowling Green's PaSean Wimberly rushed the ball for 23 yards to the 2-yard line on the Falcons' first play in overtime, then McDonald threw a 2-yard touchdown pass to running back Ta'Ron Keith to give the BGSU the 34-31 victory.





Marshall went down in defeat in its inaugural Sun Belt Conference game, falling 16-7 at Troy's Veterans Memorial Stadium. The attendance was announced at 27,514.

In a game mostly controlled by the defenses, the Trojans' defense made the team's first big play - and scored Troy's only touchdown of the game. On Marshall's initial possession of the contest, Trojan defensive lineman T.J. Jackson sacked Marshall quarterback Henry Colombi and caused a fumble, which was recovered and returned 23 yards for a touchdown by Troy nose tackle Buddha Jones.

On Troy's next possession, the team connected on a 63-yard pass from quarterback Gunnar Watson to wideout Tez Johnson to set up Trojan place kicker Brooks Buce for a 40-yard field goal that gave Troy a 10-0 lead.

It remained a 10-0 game until the latter portion of the third quarter, when Marshall cornerback Micah Abraham intercepted a tipped pass at the Troy 16-yard line. It was Abraham's third interception in Marshall's four games.

Two plays later, Thundering Herd running back Khalan Laborn scored Marshall's only touchdown of the night on a 14-yard run. Troy's Buce added two fourth-quarter field goals of 25 and 28 yards as the Trojans improved to 2-2 on the season, evened their Sun Belt Conference record at 1-1, and tied the all-time series with Marshall at 3-3.



The remnants of Hurricane Ian made for a soggy afternoon at the Joan C. Edwards Stadium, but Marshall managed a 28-7 win over the Runnin' Bulldogs of Gardner-Webb University.

Marshall scored first, capping its second possession of the game with a 24-yard touchdown pass from Henry Colombi to freshman running back A.J. Turner, who scored the first touchdown of his career.

After Gardner-Webb tied the game at 7-7 on a 45-yard interception return for a touchdown by linebacker Ty Anderson, the Thundering Herd regained the lead for good when Colombi his wide receiver Corey Gammage with a 10-yard touchdown pass.

Marshall extended its lead to 21-7 on a Khalan Laborn 1-yard run in the third quarter and set the final at 28-7 on a 78-yard Laborn run in the fourth quarter.

Running back Khalan Laborn carried the football 35 times for 191 yards in the game. His 35 carries are the most by a Marshall player since Ahmad Bradshaw carries 40 times (for 261 yards and five touchdowns) in a 49-21 win over Texas-El Paso in 2006.

Laborn's 78-yard touchdown run in the fourth quarter was Marshall's longest rush play in nearly five years -since Tyler King scored on a 90-yard touchdown run during a 31-28 win over Colorado State in the 2017 New Mexico Bowl.



Defending league champion Louisiana scored 20 unanswered points to start the second half and defeated Marshall 23-13 to spoil the Thundering Herd's inaugural Sun Belt Conference home game. For the Wednesday night contest, Marshall held a blackout at Edwards Stadium and donned all-black uniforms for the game, including black helmets for the first time in school history.

The Ragin' Cajuns scored first, midway through the first quarter, when Kenneth Almendares connected on a 42-yard field goal, his first of three in the contest.

Marshall took it's only lead of the game when running back Khalan Laborn capped a 10-play, 87-yard drive by scoring on a 1-yard run with 4:09 remaining in the second quarter. As the teams were warming up prior to start of the second half, lightning strikes in the area caused a 30-minute delay.

When play resumed, Louisiana regained the lead at the 10:30 mark of third quarter, then extended its advantage to 23-7 on two more Almendares field goals (33 and 52 yards) and a 32-yard touchdown pass from Wooldridge to Michael Jefferson.

Marshall cut the Louisiana advantage to 23-13 midway through the fourth quarter, but a two-point conversion attempt failed and neither team scored again.





Marshall nabbed the school's first Sun Belt Conference victory, in the process spoiling James Madison's homecoming game in front of a Bridgeforth Stadium record crowd of 26,159. The Dukes entered the contest with a 5-1 record and received votes in the most recent Associated Press Top 25 poll.

James Madison jumped out to a 12-2 first quarter lead, but the Dukes never scored again while Marshall rattled off 24 consecutive points.

Redshirt freshman quarterback Cam Fancher got his first career start and played the entire game for the Thundering Herd. Senior Henry Colombi, who had started every game this season, went through pregame warmups with the team, but then emerged from the lockerroom in street clothes prior to the opening coin toss.

Marshall cut the JMU advantage to 12-9 at halftime thanks to a 61-yard touchdown run by Khalan Laborn, then took a lead it would never relinquish early in the third quarter on a 57-yard touchdown pass from Fancher to junior wide receiver Corey Gammage.

Marshall added to its lead on a 38-yard field goal by Rece Verhoff midway through the third quarter, then set the final score with an 18-yard run by Laborn in the fourth quarter.

» Laborn gained 151 yards and two touchdowns on 30 carries, surpassing the 1,000 yard mark for the season. This gave him seven consecutive games with at least 100 rushing yards and at least one rushing touchdown.



Coastal Carolina jumped out to a 21-0 first quarter lead and held on to defeat Marshall 24-13

Coastal Carolina received the opening kickoff and immediately drove 76 yards in 11 plays to take a 7-0 lead when Grayson McCall scored on a 2-yard quarterback keeper. After Marshall went three-and-out, the Chanticleers upped their lead to 14-0 when backup quarterback Bryce Carpenter scored on a 3-yard run to cap a 49-yard drive. Following another Marshall punt, McCall hit tight end Jacob Jenkins with a 37-yard touchdown pass to make it 21-0 with 1:03 remaining in the first quarter.

Following one quarter of play, Coastal Carolina had out-gained Marshall, with 175 yards of total offense to the Thundering Herd's 36 yards.

After the first quarter, Marshall out-gained the Chanticleers 371 yards to 96, but never came within eight points of Coastal Carolina on the scoreboard.

Marshall scored its first points of the night at the 7:17 mark of the second quarter when quarterback Cam Fancher hit wide receiver Corey Gammage with a deep pass, on which Gammage fumbled the football, but it was recovered by Thundering Herd wideout Talik Keaton and advanced to the CCU 2-yard line. Two plays later, running back Khalan Laborn scored on a 2-yard run to make it a 21-7 game.

Rece Verhoff cut the Chanticleers' lead to 21-13 with two field goals, but the Herd would get no closer.



A dominating performance by the Thundering Herd defense and record-setting day by true-freshman place kicker Rece Verhoff led the Thundering Herd to a 12-0 shutout win at Old Dominion in front of a crowd of 18,327 at S.B. Ballard Stadium.

After a scoreless first quarter, Marshall took a 3-0 lead when Verhoff capped off a 14-play, 76-yard drive with a 33-yard field goal. That would be all the points that Marshall needed, but Verhoff added another field goal (26 yards) before halftime and then tacked on a 30-yarder in the third quarter and a 23-yarder in the fourth. Verhoff's attempt at a fifth field goal was blocked by the Monarchs' Chazz Wallace.

Verhoff's four made field goals and five field goals attempted both tied the respective Marshall records.

Even though Marshall failed to score a touchdown, the Thundering Herd ran the football effectively. As running back Khalan Laborn (139 yards on 31 carries) and quarterback Cam Fancher (18 carries, 136 yards) each eclipsed the century mark, Marshall out-rushed the Monarchs 298 yards to 11. Marshall out-gained ODU 387 yards of total offense to 198.

The win improved Marshall's all-time record against Old Dominion to 7-1.

Fancher's 136 rushing yards were the most by a Marshall quarterback since Rakeem Cato gained 143 yards (on 9 carries) during a 48-7 win over Rhode Island in 2014. The 136 rushing yards were the seventh most by a quarterback in program history.





Two days prior to the annual Memorial Fountain service to honor the 75 who died in the 1970 plane tragedy, Marshall donned its black uniforms and took the field to defeat Appalachian State, 28-21. A crowd of 24,312 attended the "Tribute Game" on a chilly, rainy day at the Joan C. Edwards Stadium.

Marshall set the tone early by taking the opening kickoff and driving 80 yards in 15 plays. Running back Khalan Laborn scored the first points of the day on a 1-yard plunge. Midway through the second quarter, Marshall capped another 80-yard drive with a 5-yard touchdown pass from quarterback Cam Fancher to wide receiver Jayden Harrison.

Appalachian State got onto the scoreboard before halftime after recovering a muffed punt at the Marshall 32-yard line and driving to score on a 1-yard run by Daetrich Harrington.

A flurry of action early in the third quarter saw Marshall score when Shadeed Ahmed blocked an Appalachian State punt, which was recovered in the end zone for a touchdown by Dainsus Miller. The ensuing kickoff was returned 96 yards for an Appalachian State touchdown by Milan Tucker, but then the Thundering Herd responded with an 8-play, 82-yard drive, scoring on a 19-yard pass from Fancher to wide receiver Corey Gammage.

The Mountaineers climbed back within seven points of Marshall on the first play of the fourth quarter on a 14-yard touchdown pass from quarterback Chase Brice to tight end Henry Pearson, and neither team scored again. Applachian State's final chance was thwarted when Marshall defensive back Daytione Smith broke up a Mountaineers' pass on fourth down with 0:36 left in the fourth quarter.



Marshall hit quickly with a 65-yard touchdown pass from Cam Fancher to wide receiver E.J. Horton just 82 seconds into the game and led the rest of the way in a 23-10 win at Georgia Southern. A Paulson Stadium crowd of 16,153 witnessed the renewal of a series that had lain dormant since 1996. Marshall became bowl eligible with the victory.

Georgia Southern cut the Marshall lead to 6-3 on a 46-yard field goal by Alex Raynor, but the Thundering Herd extended its advantage to 20-3 with two second quarter touchdowns a 33-yard pass from Fancher to Shadeed Ahmed and then a 19-yard quarterback keeper by Fancher.

The Eagles made it a 20·10 game at halftime, thanks to a 27-yard touchdown pass from Kyle Vantrease to Khaleb Hood, but then the only second half scoring came on a 36-yard field goal by the Herd's Rece Verhoff.

In the second half, Marshall held the football for 19 minutes and 56 seconds, compared to 10 minutes and 4 seconds of possession for Georgia Southern. After taking possession of the football on its own 10-yard line with 10:49 left in the game, Marshall salted away the victory with an 18-play drive that took 10:38 off the clock, at the end of which Fancher purposely went down to end the drive with only 11 seconds remaining in the contest.

Georgia Southern quarterback Kyle Vantrease entered the game with a passing average of 331 yards per game, third in the nation, but was held to 205 pass yards by the Marshall defense. The Eagles had allowed only five quarterback sacks through 10 games, but Marshall's defense sacked Vantrease twice and provided consistent pressure throughout the game.



Marshall mounted a fourth-quarter, comefrom-behind rally to win its first-ever meeting with Georgia State, 28-23. The Panthers led the game by a 17-14 score after three quarters of play. A crowd of 17,427 witnessed the Thundering Herd's regular season finale.

Georgia State, which entered the game with a 4-7 record and thus knew that this was its final game of the season, struck first by taking the opening kickoff and driving 75 yards for a touchdown, capped off by a 3-yard rush by running back Tucker Gregg. The Panthers added to their lead with a 39-yard field goal by Michael Hayes midway through the second quarter.

After being stymied by the Georgia State defense until then, Marshall rallied for its first score on a 83-yard touchdown

run by Khalan Laborn with 5:25 left in the first quarter, and then on its next possession drove 52 yards for a go-ahead touchdown, taking a 14-10 halftime lead on a 5-yard pass from Cam Fancher to Rasheen Ali.

Georgia State regained the lead on a 12-yard pass from quarterback Darren Grainger to wideout Jamari Thrash in the thid quarter, but the Thundering Herd went back in front with 10:09 left in the fourth quarter when Fancher hit redshirt freshman receiver Charles Montgomery with a 32-yard touchdown pass, the first touchdown of Montgomery's career.

Marshall made it 28-17 on a Laborn fourthand-goal run from inches from the goal line. Georgia State cut it to 28-23 on a Marcus Carroll run with 3:45 remaining in the game, but Marshall gained three first downs to run out the clock.

Charles Huff is in his second season as Marshall's head football coach. He was named to the position on January 17, 2021. Huff led his first Marshall squad to a 7-6 record and berth in the New Orleans Bowl. His reputation as a devel-oper of nationally prominent players grew with the Freshman All-American honors earned by record-breaking Thundering Herd running back Rasheen Ali and All-Conference USA recognition earned by Ali, offensive linemen Will Ulmer and Alex Mollette, defensive backs Steven Gilmore and Micah Abraham, linebacker Abraham Beau-plan, kick returner Jayden Harrison and a dozen more players who received honorable mention recognition. Defensive back Nazeeh Johnson became a seventh round draft pick of the Kansas City Chiefs.

An elite recruiter and developer of talent, Huff's proven track record bolstered head coach Nick Saban's Alabama staff for the 2019 and 2020 seasons, helping the Crimson Tide to the 2020 National Championship. He was named the 2020 National Recruiter of the Year by 247 Sports.

In his inaugural season in Tuscaloosa, Huff helped Najee Harris rush for a career-best 1,224 yards on 209 carries with 13 rushing touchdowns while catching 27 passes for 304 yards and seven more scores. Brian Robinson Jr. added 441 rushing yards and five scores while then-freshman Keilan Robinson added 254 yards and two touchdowns. In 2020, Harris was a consensus All-American who led the nation in total touch-downs (30), rushing touchdowns (26) and points (180). He also ranked third nationally in rushing yards (1,466) and holds the school record for total touchdowns (57), rushing touchdowns (46) and rushing yards (3,843).

Huff arrived in Tuscaloosa after one season (2018) as the assistant head coach, run-game coordinator and running backs





coach at Mississippi State.

The native of Denton, Maryland, boasts boasts 17 years of coaching experience on both the NFL and college levels with stops at Penn State (2014-17), Western Michigan (2013), the Buffalo Bills (2012), Vanderbilt (2011), Hampton (2010), Maryland (2009) and Tennessee State (2006-08).

Huff spent four seasons (2014-17) as Penn State's running backs coach and special teams coordinator. He recruited and developed one of the game's most electrifying players in running back Saquon Barkley, who in 2018 became the highest drafted NFL running back since Reggie Bush went No. 2 overall in 2006.

Barkley, who was called with the second overall pick by the New York Giants in the 2018 draft, produced a dynamic rookie season, rushing for 1,307 yards and 11 touchdowns. He added 91 receptions for 721 yards and four more scores to amass 2,028 yards from scrimmage on his way to Offensive Rookie of the Year honors at season's end.

Numerous records fell at the running back position and on special teams under Huff's guidance at Penn State. Barkley,



a 2017 consensus All-American, became the first Big Ten running back in history to win Offensive Player of the Year honors twice. A Walter Camp National Player of the Year finalist, Barkley ranked second nationally in all-purpose yards in 2017 (2,329).

The 2016 campaign saw the Nittany Lions claim the Big Ten Championship and it was Huff who mentored two record-breakers. Barkley broke the Penn State sophomore record for rushing yards (1,496), all-purpose yards (1,972) and points scored (132), while junior kicker Tyler Davis collected All-Big Ten first-team honors after tying the league's single-season re-cord for kicking points (128) and breaking the school record for field goals by a junior (22) and consecutive field goals made (18).

Huff recruited Barkley to Penn State, and his freshman season of 2015 was spectacular. The Freshman All-American broke the school's single-season freshman rushing record with 1,076 yards. He was named the Big Ten Network's Big Ten Freshman of the Year in the process.

Huff graduated in 2005 from Hampton University where he served as a team captain, starting 12 games at center as a senior in 2005. He also played guard, fullback and tight end in his career.

Huff resides in Huntington with his wife Jessica and their sons, BJ and Beau.


Spears was named Marshall's Athletic Director on February 21, 2022.

Spears is an accomplished leader with a proven track record of raising funds, forming corporate partnerships, and developing and executing strategic plans.

At Marshall, Spears took over a storied 16-sport athletics program with a \$30 million budget. He began his tenure March 14 and succeeded Jeff O'Malley, who led the department as interim athletic director from July 2021 to March 2022.
